Adolph Gottlieb Adolph Gottlieb, 2001 *Prehistoric Pictures and American Modernism* Elke Seibert, 2023-09-21 In April 1937 the Museum of Modern Art in New York hosted an exhibition that served as a catalyst for the appropriation of prehistoric rock art in postwar abstract painting With the title *Prehistoric Rock Pictures in Europe and Africa* it displayed a range of copies from the influential collection of the German ethnologist Leo Frobenius Largely disregarded in modern American art history up until now this book highlights the importance of this exhibition to artists such as Josef Albers Adolph Gottlieb David Smith and The American Abstract Artists group who sought inspiration from the prehistoric images primordial creativity With a transnational scope this book reveals new facts about the connections between Paris and New York and the importance of communication and collaboration between them for these artists In doing so Seibert shows that this debate was about more than just legitimizing abstract art forms from the past but about recognizing an autonomous American abstract art Presenting unseen archival material letters and exhibition documentation *Prehistoric Pictures and American Modernism* offers a new reading of the development of modern American abstraction and will hold an important place in the historiography of the movement its global traditions and its legacy Adolph Gottlieb Adolph Gottlieb, Lawrence

sudden surge in major exhibitions of Latin American art Surveying the 1960s boom of such exhibits this book documents how art produced in regions considered susceptible to communist influence was staged on U S soil for U S audiences Held in high profile venues such as the Guggenheim Museum the Walker Art Center MoMA and the Art Institute of Chicago the exhibitions of the 1960s Latin American art boom did not define a single stylistic trend or the art of a single nation but rather attempted to frame Latin America as a unified whole for U S audiences Delia Solomons calls attention to disruptive artworks that rebelled against the curatorial frames purporting to hold them and reveals these exhibitions to be complex contact zones in which competing voices collided Ultimately through multiple means including choosing to exclude artworks with readily decipherable political messages and evading references to contemporary inter American frictions the U S curators who organized these shows crafted projections of Pan American partnership and harmony with the United States as leader interpreter and good neighbor during an era of brutal U S interference across the Americas Theoretically sophisticated and highly original this survey of Cold War era Latin American art exhibits sheds light on the midcentury history of major U S art museums and makes an important contribution to the fields of museum studies art history and Latin American modernist art
