culture and offering a way out Waiting for Godot has been proclaimed the greatest play of the twentieth century But there are no great roles in it no characters representing the equivalent of Shakespeare's Hamlet Rather the two main characters are closer to T S Eliot's J Alfred Prufrock who says he cannot be a Hamlet only perhaps Hamlet's Fool This book explores what has happened as Europe's culture fragmented and the world lost its center It explores a range of different arenas from political and social and religious happenings to scientific and artistic expressions in order to find the centers of the human condition and how the dark expressions of meaninglessness so commonly highlighted are more rites of passage than the final destination
