iconography and material culture offer a window into the contested meanings and responsibilities of U S citizenship They argue that postage stamps which are both devices to pay for a government service and purchasable items themselves embody a crucial tension is democracy defined by political agency or the freedom to buy The changing images and uses of stamps reveal how governmental authorities have attempted to navigate between public service and businesslike efficiency belonging and exclusion citizenship and consumerism Stamps are vehicles for state messaging and what they depict is tied up with broader questions of what it means to be American Goldblatt and Handler combine historical sociological and iconographic analysis of a vast quantity of stamps with anthropological exploration of how postal customers and stamp collectors behave At the crossroads of several disciplines this book casts the symbolic and material meanings of stamps in a wholly new light
