Language Lateralization and Psychosis Iris E. C. Sommer, René S. Kahn, 2009-04-16 In 1861 Paul Broca discovered that in most individuals the left hemisphere of the brain is dominant for language. Taking language as an example, the first part of this book explains the normal development of bodily asymmetry and lateralization, its association with hand preference, genetic aspects, geographical differences, and the influence of gender. The coverage then moves on to review the association between language lateralization and psychosis, describing findings in patients with schizophrenia to suggest the dominant hemisphere may fail to completely inhibit the language areas in the non-dominant half. The language allowed to release from the right hemisphere can lead to psychotic symptoms including auditory verbal hallucinations and formal thought disorder.  Einleitung Die vorliegende Studie ist der Frage nachgegangen ob extreme Chronotypen damit assoziiert sind wie

Informationen rechts und linkshemisphärisch verarbeitet werden. Die zwei Hemisphären des menschlichen Gehirns unterscheiden sich nicht nur anatomisch sondern auch funktionell, was mit dem Begriff Gehirnasymmetrien bezeichnet wird. Individuelle Unterschiede der Tageszeitpräferenz von Menschen werden Chronotypen genannt. Dabei differenziert man zwischen Morgen-, Abend- und Neutraltypen. In der Literatur gibt es seit Jahrzehnten eine kontroverse Debatte darüber, ob sich Morgen- und Abendtypen nicht nur in wichtigen physiologischen und behavioralen Aspekten sondern auch in ihren Denkstilen unterscheiden. Bei Morgentypen soll eher die linkshemisphärische und bei Abendtypen die rechtshemisphärische Verarbeitungsweise im Vordergrund stehen. z.B. Corbera Grau 1993. Mit Hilfe von zwei visuellen und einer auditorischen Lateralisierungsaufgaben wurde in dieser Studie untersucht, inwiefern die hemisphärische Spezialisierung in Abhängigkeit vom Chronotyp variiert. Die Klassifizierung der Versuchspersonen in Chronotypen erfolgte über Selbst-Einschätzung mit dem Morningness-Eveningness-Questionnaire (MEQ) von Horne und Stberg 1976. Getestet wurden 441 Probanden in zwei visuellen Lateralisierungsaufgaben: Wort- und Figurenerkennungsaufgabe und einer dichotischen phonetischen Herausforderung. Mit Hilfe eines Mediansplits wurde die Gruppe in 210 Morgentypen und 231 Abendtypen eingeteilt. Bei der Figurenerkennungsaufgabe zeigten Abendtypen im rechten visuellen Halbfeld (RVHF) eine effizientere Verarbeitungsweise als Morgentypen, während Morgentypen im linken visuellen Halbfeld (LVHF) mehr richtige Antworten gegeben haben. Abendtypen waren bei dieser Aufgabe insgesamt schneller als Morgentypen. Bei der Worterkennungsaufgabe haben Abendtypen unabhängig vom visuellen Halbfeld eine schnellere und effizientere Verarbeitungsweise gezeigt als Morgentypen. Bei der dichotischen Herausforderung gab es keine signifikanten Chronotypen-Unterschiede bezüglich der Lateralität. Diese Studie liefert weitere Hinweise für mögliche Zusammenhänge zwischen funktionellen Gehirnasymmetrien und Chronotypen. Diskutiert werden methodische Einschränkungen, die sich auf die Ergebnisse ausgewirkt haben könnten. Desweiteren wird ein Ausblick gegeben, inwiefern die Ergebnisse aus neurobiologischer und pragmatischer Sicht interessant sein könnten.
