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A Grammar of Darma Christina Willis Oko, 2019-08-26 A Grammar of Darma provides the first comprehensive description of this Tibeto Burman language spoken in Uttarakhand India The analysis is informed by a functional typological framework and draws on a corpus of data gathered through elicitation observation and recordings of natural discourse Every effort has been made to describe day to day language so whenever possible illustrative examples are taken from extemporaneous speech and contextualized Sections of the grammar should appeal widely to scholars interested in South Asia s languages and cultures including discussions of the socio cultural setting the sound system morphosyntactic clause and discourse structure The grammar s interlinearized texts and glossary provide a trove of useful information for comparative linguists working on Tibeto Burman languages and anyone interested in the world s less commonly spoken languages

Nominalization in Asian Languages Foong Ha Yap, Karen Grunow-Härsta, Janick Wrona, 2011-06-29 Research on nominalization a process that gives rise to referring expressions has always played a central role in linguistic investigations Over the years there has also been growing evidence that nominalization constructions often extend to non referential domains They participate in noun modifying expressions e g genitive and relative clauses subordinate clauses and topic constructions finite structures with the nominalizers reanalyzed as TAM markers and stance constructions with evaluative attitudinal evidential and epistemic overtones This volume brings together historical and crosslinguistic evidence from more than 20 different languages representing six different language families spanning the Asian continent and the Pacific and Indian oceans to elucidate the

strategies and grammaticalization pathways that give rise to both referential and non referential uses of nominalization constructions This collection highlights the diversity of strategies and at the same time the robust cyclical nature of change within and across languages The combined diachronic and typological analyses in this volume are particularly valuable for linguistic research on diachronic morphosyntax and linguistic universals and are also an important supplementary cross referencing tool for linguistic investigations of versatile and ubiquitous morphemes in under documented languages

Egophoricity Simeon Floyd, Elisabeth Norcliffe, Lila San Roque, 2018-04-15 Egophoricity refers to the grammaticalised encoding of personal knowledge or involvement of a conscious self in a represented event or situation Most typically a marker that is egophoric is found with first person subjects in declarative sentences and with second person subjects in interrogative sentences This person sensitivity reflects the fact that speakers generally know most about their own affairs while in questions this epistemic authority typically shifts to the addressee First described for Tibeto Burman languages egophoric like patterns have now been documented in a number of other regions around the world including languages of Western China the Andean region of South America the Caucasus Papua New Guinea and elsewhere This book is a first attempt to place detailed descriptions of this understudied grammatical category side by side and to add to the cross linguistic picture of how ideas of self and other are encoded and projected in language The diverse but conceptually related egophoric phenomena described in its chapters provide fascinating case studies for how structural patterns in morphosyntax are forged under intersubjective interactional pressures as we link elements of our speech to our speech situation

Phonological Inventories of Tibeto-Burman Languages Ju Namkung, 1996 **Word Prominence in Languages with Complex Morphologies** Ksenia Bogomolets, Harry van der Hulst, 2023-03-30 This volume focuses on the theoretical and analytical challenges that languages with complex morphologies pose for the theory and typology of word level prosodic phenomena The morphological complexity and phonological length that are characteristic of words in these languages make them a particularly fruitful ground for investigating the effects of both phonological and morphological factors in the assignment of prominence The first three chapters in the volume explore general theoretical issues pertaining to word prominence in synthetic languages including the issue of wordhood and the empirical theoretical and methodological issues with delineating word level prominence and the higher level prosodic phenomena in these languages These are followed by a series of case studies on stress accent and tone in a geographically and genetically diverse set of languages with highly synthetic morphologies including languages of the Americas Europe and Asia and Australia The volume adopts an interdisciplinary perspective combining phonetic phonological and morphosyntactic insights It will be of interest not only to phonologists and morphologists but to all those interested in the typological and theoretical issues relating to polysynthetic languages **Benefactives and Malefactives** Fernando Zúñiga, Seppo Kittilä, 2010-04-14 Benefactives are constructions used to express that a state of affairs holds to someone s advantage The same construction sometimes also serves as a

Mouton Grammar Library Georg Bossong, **A Grammar of Jamsay** Jeffrey Heath, 2008-08-27 Jamsay is the largest population language among some twenty Dogon languages in Mali West Africa This is the first comprehensive grammar of any Dogon language including a full tonology The language is verb final with subject agreement on the verb and with no other case marking Its most striking feature is the morphosyntactically triggered use of stem wide tone contour overlays on nouns verbs and adjectives All stems have a lexical tone contour such as H igh L ow H HL or LHL with at least one H tone An exam of tone overlay is tone dropping to stem wide all L This is used for Perfective verbs in the presence of a focalized constituent and for a noun or adjective before an adjective It is also used to mark the head NP in a relative clause the head NP is not extracted so this is the only direct indication of head NP status The verb in a relative clause is morphologically a participle agreeing with the head NP in

humanness and number rather than with the subject Intonation is used grammatically For example NP conjunction X and Y is expressed as X Y without a conjunction but with dying quail intonation on both conjuncts Thādo Grammar Thomas Callan Hodson,1905 A Grammar of Dumi Netra Mani Rai,2017 This study explains a grammatical description of the Dumi language insightfully guided by the framework of functional typological grammar developed by Talmy Giv n 1984 2001 Dumi a Kirati language of the Rai group is poorly described Tibeto Burman language spoken in Khotang district of Eastern Nepal This grammar covers the main areas phonology morphology syntax and discourse analysis Dumi has 26 consonants together with the glottal stop and seven basic vowel phonemes with length contrast Dumi is morphologically an ergative absolutive language which is rich in case system The nominals in Dumi are inflected for a number of cases They are marked in two ways case clitics and postpositions Dumi has two types of tenses past and non past which are morphologically marked Dumi is one of the agglutinating languages and hence morphemes attached to the verb stem tense number and person The verb agreement is triggered by the number person and honorificity of the nominative subject It is a left branching and dependent marking language with the basic SOV constituent order that can also be used freely For topicalization and focusing the constituents may be permuted within the clause In Dumi the subordination system includes complement adverbial relative and converbial clauses **Grammar of the Fulah Language...** Robert Maxwell Macbrair,1854

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
