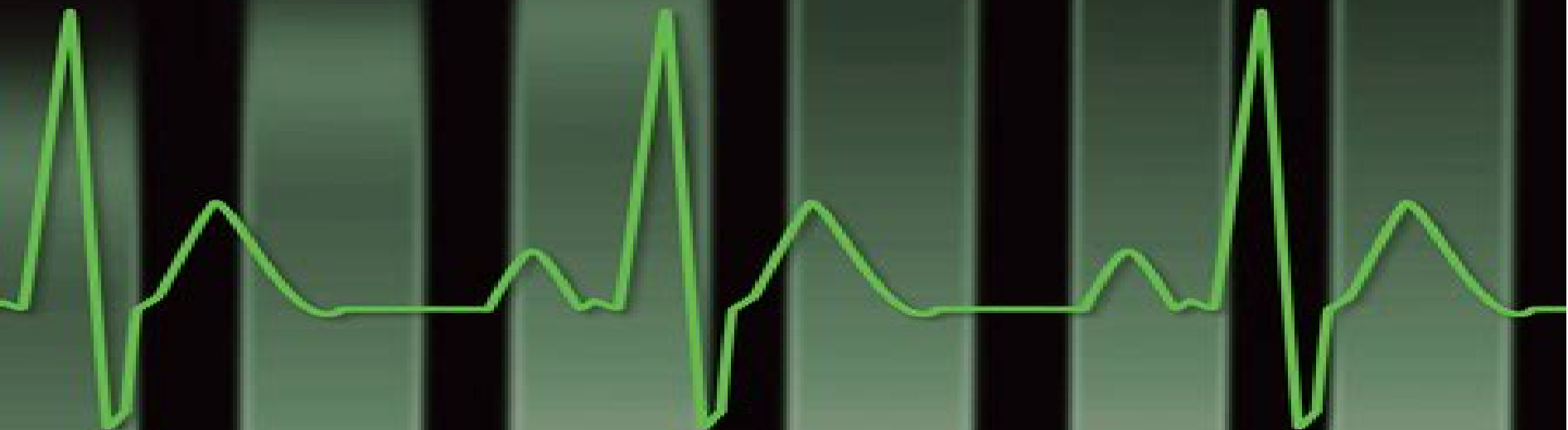

Transition-Age Youth Mental Health Care Vivien Chan, Jennifer Derenne, 2021-03-10 Over the course of the last

two decades improved practices in child and adolescent mental healthcare have led to a decreased environment of stigma which also led to an increased identification and treatment of mental health disorders in children and youth. Considering that treatment and outcomes are improved with early intervention, this is good news. However, the success gained in the field of child and adolescent psychiatry leads to a new challenge: transitioning from adolescent care to adult care. It has been known for some time that children, adult, and geriatric patients all have unique needs, where it comes to mental healthcare, yet limited work has been done where it comes to the shifting of the lifespan. Where it comes to the child-adult transition, defined as those in their late teens and early mid 20s, there can be multiple barriers in seeking mental healthcare that stem from age-appropriate developmental approaches as well as include systems of care needs. Apart from increasing childhood intervention, the problem is exacerbated by the changing social dynamics: more youths are attending college rather than diving straight into the workforce, but for various reasons, these youths can be more dependent on their parents more than previous generations. Technology has improved the daily lives of many, but it has also created a new layer of complications in the mental health world. The quality and amount of access to care between those with a certain level of privilege and those who do not have this privilege is sharp, creating more complicating factors for people in this age range. Such societal change has unfolded so rapidly that training programs have not had an opportunity to catch up, which has created a crisis for care. Efforts to modernize the approach to this unique age group are still young, and so no resource exists for any clinicians at any phase in their career. This book aims to serve as the first concise guide to fill this gap in the literature. The book will be edited by two leading figures in transition-age youth, both of whom are at institutions that have been at the forefront of this clinical work and research. This proposed mid-sized guide is therefore intended to be a collaborative effort written primarily by child and adolescent psychiatrists and also with adult psychiatrists. The aim is to discuss the developmental presentation of many common mental health diagnoses and topics in chapters, with each chapter containing clinically relevant bullet points and/or salient features that receiving providers, who are generally adult-trained, should keep in mind when continuing mental health treatment from the child and adolescent system. Chapters will cover a wide range of challenges that are unique to transition-age youths, including their unique developmental needs, anxiety, mood, and personality disorders at the interface of this development, trauma, and adjustment disorders, special populations, and a wide range of other topics. Each chapter will begin with a clinical pearl about each topic before delving into the specifics.

This study recommends actions that nonprofit programs and federal, state, and local agencies can take to help young adults make a successful transition from adolescence to adulthood. Investing in The Health and Well Being of Young Adults makes the case that increased efforts to improve high school and college graduate rates and education and workforce development systems that are more closely tied to high demand economic sectors will help this age group achieve greater opportunity and success. What happens during the young adult years has profound implications for the rest of the life course, and the stability and progress of society at large depends on how any cohort of young adults fares as a whole. Public Health Issues in the US-Mexico Border Region Cecilia Ballesteros Rosales, Scott Carter Carvajal, Jill Eileen Guernsey De Zapien, 2017-02-16. The US-Mexico border region area has unique social demographic and policy forces at work that shape the health of its residents as well as serves as a microcosm of migration health challenges facing an increasingly mobile and globalized world. This region reflects the largest migratory flow between any two nations in the world. Data from the Pew Research Center shows over the last 25 years there has never been lower than 140,000 annual immigrants from Mexico to the United States with peaks over 700,000. This migratory route is extremely hazardous due to natural e.g. arid and hot desert regions and human-made barriers as well as border enforcement practices tied to socio-political and geopolitical pressures. Also reflecting the national interdependency of public health and human services needs during the most recent five-year period surveyed, the migratory flow between the US and Mexico has equaled that of the flow of Mexico to the US, both around 1.4 million persons. Of particular public health concern within the US-Mexico region of both nations, there is among the highest disparities in income, education, infrastructure, and access to health care factors within the World Health

Organization's conceptualization of the Social Determinants of Health and among the highest rates of chronic disease. For instance, obesity and diabetes rates in this region are among the highest of those monitored in the world, with adult population estimates of the former over 40% and estimates in some population sub groups for the latter over 20%. The publications reflected in this Research Topic all reviewed from experts in the field addressed many of the public health issues in the US-Mexico Border Health Commission's Healthy Border 2020 objectives. Those objectives, broad public health goals used to guide a diverse range of government research and community-based stakeholders, include Non-Communicable Diseases including adult and childhood obesity-related ones, cancer, Infectious Diseases, e.g., tuberculosis, HIV, emerging diseases, particularly mosquito-borne illnesses, Maternal and Child Health, Mental Health Disorders, and Motor Vehicle Accidents. Other relevant public health issues affecting this region, for example, environmental health, binational health services coordination, e.g., immunization, the impact of migration throughout the Americas, and globally in this region, health issues related to the physical climate, access to quality health care, discrimination, mistreatment, and well-being, acculturative immigration stress, violence, substance use, abuse, oral health, respiratory disease, and well-being from a social determinants of health framework are critical areas addressed in these publications or for future research. Data Programs National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine, Division of Behavioral and Social Sciences and Education, Committee on National Statistics, 2017-03-13 In the U S criminal justice system in 2014 an estimated 2.2 million people were in incarcerated or under correctional supervision on any given day and another 4.7 million were under community supervision such as probation or parole Among all U S adults 1 in 31 is involved with the criminal justice system many of them having had recurring encounters The ability to measure the effects of criminal justice involvement and incarceration on health and health disparities has been a challenge due largely to limited and inconsistent measures on criminal justice involvement and any data on incarceration in health data collections The presence of a myriad of confounding factors such as socioeconomic status and childhood disadvantage also makes it hard to isolate and identify a causal relationship between criminal justice involvement and health The Bureau of Justice Statistics collects periodic health data on the people who are incarcerated at any given time but few national level surveys have captured criminal justice system involvement for people previously involved in the system or those under community supervision nor have they collected systematic data on the effects that go beyond the incarcerated individuals themselves In March 2016 the National Academies of Sciences Engineering and Medicine held a workshop meant to assist the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Planning and Evaluation ASPE and Office of the Minority Health OMH in the U S Department of Health and Human Services in identifying measures of criminal justice involvement that will further their understanding of the socioeconomic determinants of health
