

15 MOST COMMON LITERARY DEVICES

Literary Device	Definition	Example
ONomatopoeia	Is a word that <u>imitates</u> the sound it represents.	crash rip tick-tock whooosh
Personification	Is when a writer gives human qualities to animals or objects.	My car <u>shook</u> the gasoline in one gulp. The cat <u>laughed</u> . The newspaper headline <u>glared</u> at me.
Alliteration	Is the repetition of the same consonant sound in words occurring near one another.	Peter Piper picked a peck of pickled peppers. Sally sells seashells by the seashore.
Symbolism	Is using an object or action that <u>stands</u> something more than its literal meaning.	Red symbolizes the fight against breast cancer. The Statue of Liberty symbolizes freedom.
Paradox	Is a truth which at first seems <u>contradictory</u> .	He was cowardly and brave at the same time. When you win all the time, you lose.
Oxymoron	Is an obvious contradiction or <u>overstatement</u> .	I'm so hungry I could eat the entire buffet at Golden Corral right now!
Simile	Is an expression comparing one thing to another using the words "like" or "as".	He ran like a car, lightly and quickly. Her nose moved around as quickly as an airplane's tail fin.
Metaphor	Is a comparison of two unlike things without using the words "like" or "as".	He was a statue, waiting to hear the news. She was a mother hen, trying to take care of everyone around her.
Allusion	Is a casual reference to a famous historical or literary figure or event.	If I don't stop reading, I'm going to build an ark. My sister has so many pets I'm going to call her Mr. Old McDonald.
Imagery	Is when a writer involves the five <u>senses</u> .	The smell reminded him of roasting tomatoes. The fence was uneven, like baby teeth growing awkwardly in. (also a simile) I got cold feet before my big date = I was scared. My house grew on the green light = My house sold fast.
Idiom	Is an expression with a meaning different from the <u>literal</u> meaning of the words.	
Oxymoron	Is the juxtaposition of two <u>opposite</u> ideas.	a powerful war a generous tightwad dark sunlight
Euphemism	Is a polite word or phrase used in place of one that may be too direct, unpleasant, or embarrassing.	pass away = die vertically challenged = short
Clutch	Is an expression that has lost its power or <u>signifying</u> from constant use.	talking a mile a minute quiet as a mouse easy as pie
Pun	Is a humorous play on words, often involving double meanings.	There was a shootout in the Gaps. There were many casualties. A man stole a case of soap from the corner store. He made a <u>great</u> prisoner.
