Topic 6.1 Rationales for Imperialism from 1750 to 1900

Learning Objective	Historical Developments	
Explain how ideologies contributed to the development of imperialism from 1750 to 1900.	A range of cultural, religious, and racial ideologies were used to justify imperialism, including Social Darwinism , nationalism , the concept of the Christian mission , and the desire to religiously convert indigenous populations.	<p>1. Explain Social Darwinism. Social Darwinism is the belief that only the fittest will survive in political and economic struggles. It also claims that some races are superior and stronger, and have the right to take over weaker races.</p> <p>2. Explain the concept of the "civilizing mission." Western countries would bring advancements in society/technology, so imperialism was benefiting the conquered people. The west also felt as if it was their duty to spread their knowledge and protection. Because of the sense of racial superiority, the Europeans felt that other races were not as "civilized," so they thought they should colonize other countries to bring them civilization.</p> <p>3. Explain how the ideology of Social Darwinism contributed to the development of imperialism from 1750 to 1900. Social Darwinism contributed to the development of imperialism from 1750 to 1900 because it made many Europeans believe that other races were uncivilized, and therefore that their government should be overpowered, which motivated Europeans to imperialize.</p> <p>4. Explain how the ideology of nationalism contributed to the development of imperialism from 1750 to 1900. The ideology of nationalism contributed to the development of imperialism from 1750 to 1900 because it was an idea that was growing during this time that caused Europeans to think that their own countries were superior than others, motivating them to imperialize.</p>

Compare processes by which state power shifted in various parts of the world from 1750 to 1900.	<p>Some states with existing colonies strengthened their control over those colonies and in some cases assumed direct control over colonies previously held by non-state entities.</p> <p>Non-state to state colonial control</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Shift from the private ownership of the Congo by King Leopold II to the Belgium government Shift from the Dutch East India Company to Dutch government control in Indonesia and Southeast Asia 	<p>5. Give a specific example of a state that strengthened their control over existing colonies. Europeans, specifically the British, strengthened their control in West Africa using both warfare and diplomacy.</p> <p>6. Explain King Leopold II and his involvement with the Congo. He was the Belgian king who opened up the African interior to European trade along the Congo River, to shift from the private ownership of the Congo to the Belgium government. By 1884, the controlled area was known as the Congo Free State.</p> <p>7. What territories did the US acquire in the 1750 to 1900 time period? Mexico, Alaska, Hawaii, Cuba, Guam, Philippines, and Puerto Rico.</p> <p>8. What territories did Japan acquire in the 1750 to 1900 time period? Taiwan, Korea, Harbin, and the Kurile Islands.</p>
