Kunhardt (Jr.), Irvin Mayfield, 2013 This volume explores the making of Gordon Parks first photographic essay for Life magazine in 1948 Harlem Gang Leader After gaining the trust of one particular group of gang members and their leader Leonard Red Jackson Parks produced a series of photographs that are artful poignant and at times shocking From this large body of work Parks made hundreds of negatives the editors at Life selected twenty one pictures to print in the magazine often cropping or enhancing details in the pictures Gordon Parks The Making of an Argument traces this editorial process and parses out the various voices and motives behind the production of the picture essay This volume together with an exhibition of the same name at the New Orleans Museum of Art NOMA considers Parks photographic practice within a larger discussion about photography as a narrative device Featuring vintage photographs original issues of Life magazine contact sheets and proof prints Gordon Parks The Making of an Argument raises important questions about the role of photography in addressing social concerns its use as a documentary tool and its function in the world of publishing The book includes contributions from Susan M Taylor The Montine McDaniel Freeman Director of the New Orleans Museum of Art Peter W Kunhardt Jr Executive Director of The Gordon Parks Foundation and Irvin Mayfield Artistic Director of the New Orleans Jazz Orchestra

**The Making of Visual News** Thierry Gervais, Gaëlle Morel, 2020-09-23 The Making of Visual News sets out to show how photography has changed the way we read report and sell the news It investigates how photographs first became news images at the end of the nineteenth century and how magazines in the USA the UK France and Germany have put them to use ever since Drawing on a wide selection of images author Thierry Gervais in collaboration with Gaëlle Morel analyses news photographs in the context of their original presentation in print Highly illustrated the book contains 85 full colour magazine layouts and spreads offering the reader a view of how photographs were and are used in print publications including Life Picture Post the Berliner Illustrierte Zeitung and VU It examines how photographs were employed to attract new readers throughout the twentieth century arguing that photography was the main tool by which news editors sought to communicate the news and attract a broader readership Looking beyond the roles of photographer and journalist this study also highlights the contributions of picture editors and artistic directors by commissioning photographs and incorporating images into magazine layouts these figures played critical but often overlooked roles in the construction of visual news even as they crafted unique styles for their publications Charting changes in technology and reportage as well as broader social and political histories The Making of Visual News offers new insight into the history of photojournalism making this an essential resource for students and scholars of photojournalism and the history of photography media and culture

Flash! Kate Flint, 2017-11-17 Flash presents a fascinating cultural history of flash photography from its mid nineteenth century beginnings to the present day All photography requires light but the light of flash photography is quite distinctive artificial sudden shocking intrusive and

between social reform photography and photojournalism is examined through this study of the life and work of German gr ansel Mieth 1909 1998 who made an unlikely journey from migrant farm worker to Life photographer She was the second woman in that role after Margaret Bourke White Unlike her colleagues Mieth was a working class reformer with a deep disdain for Life s conservatism and commercialism In fact her work often subverted Life s typical representations of women

workers and minorities Some of her most compelling photo essays used skillful visual storytelling to offer fresh views on controversial topics birth control vivisection labor unions and Japanese American internment during the Second World War Her dual role as reformer and photojournalist made her a desirable commodity at Life in the late 1930s and early 40s but this role became untenable in Cold War America when her career was cut short Today Mieth's life and photographs stand as compelling reminders of the vital yet overlooked role of immigrant women in twentieth century photojournalism Women Workers and Race in LIFE Magazine draws upon a rich array of primary sources including Mieth's unpublished memoir oral histories and labor archives The book seeks to unravel and understand the multi layered often contested stories of the photographer's life and work It will be of interest to scholars of photography history women's studies visual culture and media history

Christo and Jeanne-Claude Burt Chernow, Wolfgang Volz, 2005 For their sheer scale and breathtaking audacity their works have made them among the most celebrated and controversial artists in the world Valley Curtain stretched 1 250 feet across a valley in Rifle Colorado Wrapped Coast covered a mile and a half of Australian coastline with a million square feet of fabric The Umbrellas deployed 3 100 umbrellas set in Japan and California each nearly twenty feet tall Surrounded Islands encircled eleven islands in Biscayne Bay Florida with six and a half million square feet of bright pink fabric and Wrapped Reichstag enveloped the entire German parliament in shimmering silver fabric For more than forty years these and many other works by Christo and Jeanne Claude have reconceived the art of the possible turned natural and human monuments streets bridges hills trees buildings parks and islands into sculptures and paintings and created dazzling new landscapes and startling new vistas Often requiring years even decades of preparation and planning these works not merely feats of aesthetic daring but engineering and organizational marvels exist for only a few weeks or less Yet what makes these transient creations linger forever in the mind is their overwhelming and magisterial beauty They are in every sense transformative and for the millions who have experienced them in person unforgettable Christo and Jeanne Claude have been the frequent subjects of films videos catalogues cartoons monographs exhibitions and editorials Until this biography by Burt Chernow however written with the full cooperation of the artists nothing has connected the intimate details of their lives and the spectacular dimensions of their projects Christo the penniless Bulgarian refugee who made his way to Paris during the 1950s and Jeanne Claude the socialite daughter of a prominent French general seemed an unlikely

Chernow recounts their rise from relative obscurity to international renown, revealing both the sources of their art and the heights to which it has quite literally aspired. An epilogue by Wolfgang Volz, a longtime and close collaborator of the artists as well as their exclusive photographer, provides a fascinating insider's view of what it is like to work and dream with them. Christo and Jeanne Claude is an indelible portrait of the artists and their work and a moving account of an extraordinary couple.

*Representation* Stuart Hall, 1997-04-08 This broad-ranging text offers a comprehensive outline of how visual images, language, and discourse work as systems of representation. *The Jim Crow Routine* Stephen A. Berrey, 2015-04-27 The South's system of Jim Crow racial oppression is usually understood in terms of legal segregation that mandated the separation of white and black Americans. Yet, as Stephen A. Berrey shows, it was also a high-stakes drama that played out in the routines of everyday life, where blacks and whites regularly interacted on sidewalks and buses and in businesses and homes. Every day, individuals made, unmade, and remade Jim Crow in how they played their racial roles, how they moved, talked, even gestured. The highly visible but often subtle nature of these interactions constituted the Jim Crow routine. In this study of Mississippi race relations in the final decades of the Jim Crow era, Berrey argues that daily interactions between blacks and whites are central to understanding segregation and the racial system that followed it. Berrey shows how civil rights activism, African Americans' refusal to follow the Jim Crow script, and national perceptions of southern race relations led Mississippi segregationists to change tactics. No longer able to rely on the earlier routines, whites turned instead to less visible but equally insidious practices of violence, surveillance, and policing rooted in a racially coded language of law and order. Reflecting broader national transformations, these practices laid the groundwork for a new era marked by black criminalization, mass incarceration, and a growing police presence in everyday life.

**A Nimble Arc** Emilie Boone, 2023-08-28 While James Van Der Zee is widely known and praised for his studio portraits from the Harlem Renaissance era, much of the diversity and expansive reach of his work has been overlooked. From the major role his studio played for decades photographing ordinary people and events in the Harlem community to the inclusion of his photographs in the landmark *Harlem on My Mind* exhibition at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in 1969, Van Der Zee was a foundational Black photographer whose work illustrates the shifting ways photography serves

as a constitutive force within Black life In *A Nimble Arc* Emilie Boone considers Van Der Zee's photographic work over the course of the twentieth century showing how it foregrounded aspects of Black daily life in the United States and in the larger African diaspora Boone argues that Van Der Zee's work exists at the crossroads of art and the vernacular challenging the distinction between canonical art photographs and the kind of output common to commercial photography studios Boone's account recasts our understanding not only of this celebrated figure but of photography within the arc of quotidian Black life
