Latino Dreams Paul Allatson, 2002 A welcome addition to the fields of Latino and trans American cultural and literary studies *Latino Dreams* focuses on a selection of Latino narratives published between the mid 1980s and the mid 1990s that may be said to traffic in the U S A s attendant myths and governing cultural logics The selection includes novels by authors who have received little academic attention Abraham Rodriguez Achy Obejas and Benjamin Alire S enz along with underattended texts from more renowned writers Rosario Ferr Coco Fusco and Guillermo G mez Pe a *Latino Dreams* takes a transcultural approach in order to raise questions of subaltern subordination and domination and the resistant capacities of cultural production The analysis explores how the selected narratives deploy specific narrative tactics and a range of literary and other cultural capital in order to question and reform the U S A s imaginary coordinates In these texts moreover national imperatives are complicated by recourse to feminist queer panethnic postcolonial or transnational agendas Yet the analysis also recognizes instances in which the counter narrative will is frustrated the narratives may provide signs of the U S A s hegemonic resilience in the face of imaginary disavowal

Killing Spanish L. Sandin, 2016-02-19 In this intelligent monograph for women s studies literature and Latin American studies Lyn Di Iorio Sandin asserts that there is a significant ambivalence surrounding identity that is present in the works of Latino writers such as Cristina Garcia Edward Rivera and Abraham Rodriguez Sandin incorporates the theories of allegory and double identity to talk about fragmentation of the Latino psyche What Sandin finds compelling is that in all of the works of this diverse group of writers there is a common theme of anxiety about origins that manifests itself through the symbols of dead women ghosts or madwomen Using specific examples from literature ranging from Cuban American Cristina Garcia s *The Aguero Sisters* to Puerto Rican Rosario Ferre s *Maldito amor* Sandin finds that fragmented ethnic identification is an area that is just beginning to be explored within the analysis of U S Latino fiction

The Bilingual Text Jan Walsh Hokenson, Marcella Munson, 2014-06-03

Bilingual texts have been left outside the mainstream of both translation theory and literary history. Yet the tradition of the bilingual writer moving between different sign systems and audiences to create a text in two languages is a rich and venerable one going back at least to the Middle Ages. The self-translated bilingual text was commonplace in the multilingual world of medieval and early modern Europe, frequently bridging Latin and the vernaculars. While self-translation persisted among cultured elites, it diminished during the consolidation of the nation-states in the long era of nationalistic monolingualism, only to resurge in the postcolonial era. *The Bilingual Text* makes a first step toward providing the fields of translation studies and comparative literature with a comprehensive account of literary self-translation in the West. It tracks the shifting paradigms of bilinguality across the centuries and addresses the urgent questions that the bilingual text raises for translation theorists today: Is each part of the bilingual text a separate original creation, or is each incomplete without the other? Is self-translation a unique genre? Can either version be split off into a single language or literary tradition? How can two linguistic versions of a text be fitted into standard models of foreign and domestic texts and cultures? Because such texts defeat standard categories of analysis, *The Bilingual Text* reverses the usual critical gaze, highlighting not dissimilarities but continuities across versions, allowing for dissimilarities within orders of correspondence and englobing the literary as well as linguistic and cultural dimensions of the text. Emphasizing the arcs of historical change in concepts of language and translation that inform each case study, *The Bilingual Text* examines the perdurance of this phenomenon in Western societies and literatures.
