The buffer state created between France and Italy hindered French expansion for many centuries and helped preserve the independence of Italy Drawing upon much unpublished material Professor Cox traces the social and political evolution of the principality. He discusses how the Savoyard state was governed financed and defended. He also provides a fascinating biography of the Green Count Originally published in 1967. sixteenth centuries Part I of the volume provides a representative selection of sixteen translated and contextualised sources on the pas d armes that includes narrative texts administrative accounts and illuminated images Part II which comprises seven new scholarly essays on the pas d armes addresses the issue of how this type of tournament evolved through cultural transfer from court to court offers in depth analyses of a chronological and geographical range of pas d armes from the perspective of text image relations heraldry urban court relations and manuscript commissioning and focuses on broader themes such as the construction of masculinity and the representation of chivalric and non chivalric bodies at these events The Casebook also provides a map and table of all such tournaments known to have taken place between c 1420 and c 1520 some of which have been identified for the first time as pas d armes as well as a glossary of arms and armour clothing and textiles typically featured at this type of event It will be of interest to both specialist scholars and students of late medieval Poisoned Wells Tzafrir Barzilay, 2022-03-22 Between 1348 and 1350 Jews throughout chivalric and tournament culture Europe were accused of having caused the spread of the Black Death by poisoning the wells from which the entire population drank Hundreds if not thousands were executed from Aragon and southern France into the eastern regions of the German speaking lands But if the well poisoning accusations against the Jews during these plaque years are the most frequently cited of such cases they were not unique The first major wave of accusations came in France and Aragon in 1321 and it was lepers not Jews who were the initial targets Local authorities and especially municipal councils promoted these charges so as to be able to seize the property of the leprosaria Tzafrir Barzilay contends The allegations eventually expanded to describe an international conspiracy organized by Muslims and only then after months of persecution of the lepers did some nobles of central France implicate the Jews convincing the king to expel them from the realm In Poisoned Wells Barzilay explores the origins of these charges of well poisoning asks how the fear took root and moved across Europe which groups it targeted why it held in certain areas and not others and why it waned in the fifteenth century He argues that many of the social political and environmental factors that fed the rise of the mass poisoning accusations had already appeared during the thirteenth century a period of increased urbanization of criminal poisoning charges and of the proliferation of medical texts on toxins In studying the narratives that were presented to convince officials that certain groups committed well poisoning and the legal and bureaucratic mechanisms that moved rumors into officially accepted and prosecutable crimes Barzilay has written a crucial chapter in the long history of the persecution of European minorities Plagues, poisons and potions William G. Naphy, 2021-02-02 Plagues poisons and potions highlights one of the most fascinating aspects of the history of early modern plague In the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries outbreaks of plague in and around the ancient Duchy of Savoy led to the arrests of many people who were accused of conspiring to spread the disease Those implicated in the conspiracies were usually poor female migrants working in the plague hospitals under the direction of educated professional male barber surgeons These conspirators were subsequently tried for spreading plague among leading and wealthy people from urban
