## The Play

The "Tragedy of Macbeth", set in Scotland, is a play that dramatizes the destructive outcomes that are produced when evil is chosen as a way to fulfill ambition for power. The play is believed to have been written between 1606 and 1607, and is most commonly dated from its earliest known literary reference during the reign of James VI of Scotland before he succeeded to the English throne in 1603. James was a patron of Shakespeare's acting company, and of all the plays Shakespeare wrote during James's reign, "Macbeth" most clearly reflected the playwright's relationship with the new king. "Macbeth" is Shakespeare's shortest tragedy, and tells the story of a brave Scottish general named Macbeth who receives a prophecy from a trio of witches that one day he will become King of Scotland. Consumed by ambition and spurred to action by his wife, Macbeth murders King Duncan and takes the throne for himself. He is then wracked with guilt and paranoia, and he soon becomes a tyrannical ruler as he is forced to commit more and more murders to protect himself from scrutiny and suspicion.
