food production trade and consumption were booming The overarching argument of the book is that a systematic study of the complex and changing relationship between vegetarian and non vegetarian understandings and practices illuminates broader transformations and challenges that relate to markets the state religion politics and identities in India and beyond The book s empirical focus is on the changing relationship between vegetarian non vegetarian as understood practised and contested in middle class India while remaining attentive to the vegetarian non vegetarian modernities that are at the forefront of global sustainability debates Through the application of this approach the book provides a novel theory of human values and markets in a global middle class perspective

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
