Based on a study of 100 non permanent workers in Singapore, it offers a model to guide thinking about workers learning and development in terms of an integrated practice of craft, entrepreneurial and personal learning to learn skills. The book considers how strategies for continuing education and training can better fit with the realities of non permanent work. Through its use of case studies, the book examines the significance of non permanent work and its rise as a global phenomenon. It considers the reality of being a non permanent worker and reactions to learning opportunities for these individuals. The book draws these aspects together to present a conceptual frame of integrated practices challenging educational institutions and training providers to design and deliver learning and the enacted curriculum not as separate pieces of a puzzle but as an integrated whole. With conclusions that have wider salience for public policy responses to the rise of non permanent work, this book will be of great interest to academics and researchers in the fields of adult education, educational policy and lifelong learning.
