many similar efforts around the United States from New York to Charleston Seattle to Cincinnati Hayden finds a broad new movement across urban preservation public history and public art to accept American diversity at the heart of the vernacular urban landscape She provides dozens of models for creative urban history projects in cities and towns across the country

Behind the Gospels Eric Eve, 2014 New Testament scholars often talk about oral tradition as a means by which material about Jesus reached the Gospels writers Despite the recent interest in oral tradition scholarly advances have not penetrated the mainstream of academic Gospels scholarship let alone the wider public Behind the Gospels fills this gap offering a general theoretical discussion of oral tradition and the formation of ancient texts and providing a critical survey of the field
