Knowing Otherwise Alexis Shotwell, 2011 Draws on philosophers political theorists activists and poets to explain how unspoken and unspeakable knowledge is important to racial and gender formation offers a usable conception of implicit understanding Provided by publishers **In Kierkegaard's Garden with the Poppy Blooms** Chris Boesel, 2021-07-27 Chris Boesel invites readers into a Kierkegaardian style literary conceit creating two pseudonymous voices one philosophical and deconstructive one theological and confessional in order to stage an encounter between two commentaries on Kierkegaard's *Fear and Trembling* On one level the contest between the two commentaries demonstrates the extent to which an encounter between deconstruction and Kierkegaard has not taken place in the one place everyone thinks it has in Derrida's reading of *Fear and Trembling* in *The Gift of Death* On a deeper level Boesel argues that Derrida's misreading of *Fear and Trembling* is both source and symptom of a wider problem an apophatic blind spot in deconstructive engagements with Christian theology in philosophy of religion and postmodern theology This blind spot erases the theological and ethical possibilities of what Boesel calls a Kierkegaardian confessional faith possibilities rooted in a deconstructive deconstructibility that produces its own deconstructive like effects As a corrective to this blind spot the encounter between deconstruction and Kierkegaard staged here shows how these effects do the very things heralded by self-proclaimed apophatic remedies of confessional faith disrupt human mastery over God and neighbor while calling for concrete commitments to justice for the widow orphan and stranger *White Educators Negotiating Complicity* Barbara Applebaum, 2021-11-17 While there is a proliferation of research on white educators who teach courses around anti-racism *White Educators Negotiating Complicity* Roadblocks Paved with Good Intentions focuses on white educators who teach about whiteness to racially diverse groups of students and who acknowledge and attempt to negotiate their complicity in systemic injustice Scholars continue to remind white people of the paradox through which their endeavors to disrupt systemic white supremacy often reproduce it In this book Barbara Applebaum explores what it means to teach against whiteness while living that paradox Rather than an empirical study this book offers insights from recent scholarship surrounding critical whiteness and epistemic injustice and applies them to some of the most trenchant challenges that white educators face while trying to teach about whiteness to racially diverse groups of students Introducing the concept of a vigilantly vulnerable and informed humility Applebaum both illuminates what theory can tell us about praxis and offers guidance for white educators in their attempts to negotiate the effects of white complicity on their pedagogy *Mestizos Come Home!* Robert Con Davis-Undiano, 2017-03-30 Uruguayan writer Eduardo Galeano has described U.S. and Latin American culture as continually hobbled by amnesia unable or unwilling to remember the influence of mestizos and indigenous populations In *Mestizos Come Home* author Robert Con Davis-Undiano documents the great awakening of Mexican American and Latino culture since the 1960s that has challenged this omission in collective memory He maps a new awareness of the United States as intrinsically connected to the broader context of the
