Respiratory Rates

A student completed a lab activity that demonstrated the connection between pulse rate, heart rate, and flow of blood during exercise. She left her class wondering if there is a connection between breathing rate and exercise. With the help of her track coach, she conducted an investigation to try and find an answer to her question.

In the investigation, the respiratory rates of thirty athletes were measured before any exercise. To measure their rate, they counted the number of times they took a breath in one minute. Then, they ran one lap around the track, and their respiratory rates were determined again. Finally they ran two laps around the track and checked their respiratory rates one last time. All of their data were recorded, and the averages were calculated. The data table shows the information obtained in this investigation.

The Effect of Exercise on the Respiratory Rates of Thirty Athletes
