The Making of Modern Hindi Sujata S. Mody, 2018-08-22 In the early twentieth century British imperialism in India was at its peak and anti colonial sentiments were on the rise The nationalist desire for cultural self identification was gaining ground and an important articulation of this was the demand for a national language and literature to represent a modern India It was in this context that Mahavir Prasad Dwivedi a novel daring and contentious litterateur launched his multimedia campaign of constructing a new Hindi literary establishment As the long time editor of the Hindi journal Sarasvat Dwivedi s influence was so far reaching that this period of modern literature in Hindi is known as the Dwivedi era However he had to face stiff opposition as well Sujata Mody s book sheds light on the interactions between Dwivedi and his supporters and detractors and shows how Dwivedi s responses to challenges were pragmatic and strategically varied The Making of Modern Hindi presents Dwivedi as a dynamic and influential arbiter of literary modernity whose exchanges with competing authorities are an important piece in the history of Hindi literature
