



Infection Control in Care Homes

Does the threat of MRSA, C Diff and Norovirus feel like a constant struggle?

It doesn't have to.

Here at Gompels we have a simple 6 step guide to make infection control a simple routine.

1

Hand Hygiene

Hand hygiene should be performed using hand sanitisers immediately after touching bodily fluids and contaminated items, whether or not gloves are worn.

Hand hygiene should be performed immediately after gloves are removed, between patient contact and when otherwise indicated to avoid transfer of micro organisms to other patients or environments.

When hands are visibly soiled, hands should be washed with soap and water.

It is also necessary to perform hand hygiene between tasks and procedures on the same patient to prevent cross contamination of different body sites.



Gloving

Wear gloves when it can be reasonably anticipated that contact with bodily fluids could occur.

Remove gloves after contact with a patient, or the surrounding environment, using proper technique to prevent hand contamination.

Do not wear the same pair of gloves for the care of more than one patient.

Do not wash gloves for the purpose of re-use since this practice has been associated with the transmission of pathogens.

Appropriate Handling of Equipment & Instruments

Handle soiled patient care equipment in a manner that prevents skin exposure, contamination to clothing and transfer of micro organisms to other patients and the environment.

Ensure that reusable equipment is not used for the care of another patient until it has been appropriately cleaned and reprocessed, and that single use items are properly discarded.

Clean and disinfect surfaces that are likely to be contaminated with pathogens, including those that are in close proximity to the patient and those that are touched on a more frequent basis compared to other surfaces.

Appropriate Handling of Laundry

Handle, transport and process soiled laundry in soluble laundry sacks to avoid contamination of skin, air and surfaces.

Mouth, Nose & Eye Protection



Use PPE to protect the mucous membranes of the eyes, nose and mouth during procedures and patient care activities that are likely to generate splashes or sprays of bodily fluids.

Masks, goggles, and face shields should be worn according to the need of the task being performed.

Gowning

Gowns or aprons appropriate to the task being performed should be worn to protect contamination of clothing during procedures and patient care activities when bodily fluids are anticipated.
