ACT TWO - SCENE 1:

Banquo also wants the prediction made about himself to be fulfilled, but he is not willing to do anything dishonorable to make it happen. He says he is loyal to the King.

1. Banquo leaves, and Macbeth is left with his thoughts. Explain Macbeth's soliloquy and his feelings as he goes to commit the murder. **He is beginning to hallucinate about a dagger, because he is feeling guilty about killing Duncan.**
