Jerry Lewis Chris Fujiwara:

Jerry Lewis Chris Fujiwara, 2010-10-01 Well known for his slapstick comedic style Jerry Lewis has also delighted worldwide movie audiences with a directing career spanning five decades One of American cinema's great innovators Lewis made unmistakably personal films that often focused on an ideal masculine image and an anarchic manic acting out of the inability to assume this image Films such as *The Bellboy* *The Errand Boy* *Three on a Couch* and *The Big Mouth* present a series of thematic variations on this tension in which such questions as how to be a man how to be popular and how to maintain relationships are posed within frameworks that set up a liberating and exhilarating confusion of roles and norms *The Nutty Professor* and *The Patsy* are especially profound and painful examinations of the difficulty experienced by Lewis's character in reconciling loving himself and being loved by others With sharp concise observations Chris Fujiwara examines this visionary director of self-referential comedic masterpieces The book also includes an enlightening interview with Lewis that offers unique commentary on the creation and study of comedy

Beyond Realism Robert Singer, 2024-04-30 *Beyond Realism* *Naturalist Film in Theory and Practice* is the first major critical study of international naturalist cinema Often mistaken for realist film international naturalist cinema has a unique cultural and critical history From its earliest representation in silent films such as Walsh's *Regeneration* 1915 and Eisenstein's *Stachka* *Strike* 1925 to recent productions such as Chukwu's *Clemency* 2019 and Aronofsky's *The Whale* 2022 the naturalist film narrative encompasses the whole of film history traversing language movement and genre The naturalist film is predicated on two foundational intersecting paradigms that configure as one ideological system in an overarching scientific and social experimental narrative Either the scientific or social paradigm may be dominant in the film narrative or they may simply co-exist but a naturalist film reveals both templates and most significantly suggests an implicit cinematic anthropology that renders the body as an observed spectacle

Lars von Trier Linda Badley, 2011-02-24 Scandinavia's foremost living auteur and the catalyst of the Dogme95 movement Lars von Trier is arguably world cinema's most confrontational and polarizing figure Willfully devastating audiences he takes risks few filmmakers would conceive mounting projects that somehow transcend the grand follies they narrowly miss becoming Challenging conventional limitations and imposing his own rules he restlessly reinvents the film language The Danish director has therefore cultivated an insistently transnational cinema taking inspiration from sources that range from the European avant-garde to American genre films This volume provides a stimulating overview of Trier's career while focusing on the more recent work including his controversial *Gold Heart Trilogy* *Breaking the Waves* *The Idiots* and *Dancer in the Dark* the as yet unfinished *USA Trilogy* *Dogville* and *Manderlay* and individual projects such as the comedy *The Boss of It All* and the incendiary horror psychodrama *Antichrist* Closely analyzing the films and their contexts Linda Badley draws on a range of cultural references and critical approaches including genre gender and cultural studies performance theory and trauma culture Two revealing interviews that Trier granted during crucial stages of *Antichrist*'s

The Slapstick Camera Burke Hilsabeck, 2020-02-01 Demonstrates that slapstick film comedies display a canny and sometimes profound understanding of their medium Slapstick film comedy may be grounded in idiocy and failure but the genre is far more sophisticated than it initially appears In this book Burke Hilsabeck suggests that slapstick is often animated by a philosophical impulse to understand the cinema He looks closely at movies and gags that represent the conditions and conventions of cinema production and demonstrates that film comedians display a canny and sometimes profound understanding of their medium from Buster Keaton's encounter with the film screen in *Sherlock Jr* 1924 to Harpo Marx's lip sync turn with a phonograph in *Monkey Business* 1931 to Jerry Lewis's film on film performance in *The Errand Boy* 1961 *The Slapstick Camera* follows the observation of philosopher Stanley Cavell that self-reference is one way in which film exists in a state of philosophy By moving historically across the studio era the book looks at a series of comedies that play with the changing technologies and economic practices behind film production and describes how comedians offered their own

Emir Kusturica
