**The Lost Vanguard** Richard Pare, Jean-Louis Cohen, 2007 This book includes seventy three structures starting with the Shabolovka Radio Tower in Moscow and concluding with the Lenin Mausoleum In between are buildings from all over Moscow where the greatest concentration of modernist buildings still remains St Petersburg Ivanovo Ekaterinburg Kiev Kharkov Zaporozhe Nizhi Novgorod Sochi and Baku The buildings range from grand projects such as Gasprom in Kharkov to a modest bus shelter in Sochi a rare survivor by an unknown architect In an essay architectural historian Jean Louis Cohen surveys the history of the period providing a context for the emergence of this startling new architecture in parallel to contemporary experiments in Europe **BOOK JACKET**

**Acrobatic Modernism from the Avant-Garde to Prehistory** Jed Rasula, 2020-02-27 This is a book about artistic modernism contending with the historical transfigurations of modernity As a conscientious engagement with modernity's restructuring of the lifeworld the modernist avant garde raised the stakes of this engagement to programmatic explicitness But even beyond the vanguard the global phenomenon of jazz combined somatic assault with sensory tutelage Jazz like the new technologies of modernity re calibrated sensory ratios The criterion of the new as self making also extended to names pseudonyms and heteronyms The protocols of modernism solicited a pragmatic arousal of bodily sensation as artistic resource validating an acrobatic sensibility ranging from slapstick and laughter to the pathos of bereavement Expressivity trumped representation The artwork was a diagram of perception not a mimetic rendering For artists the historical pressures of altered perception provoked new models and Ezra Pound's slogan Make It New became the generic rallying cry of renovation The paradigmatic stance of the avant garde was established by Futurism but the discovery of prehistoric art added another provocation to artists Paleolithic caves validated the spirit of all over composition unframed and dynamic Geometric abstraction Constructivism and Purism and Surrealism were all in quest of a new mythology Making it new yielded a new pathos in the sensation of radical discrepancy between futurist striving and remotest antiquity The Paleolithic cave and the USSR emitted comparable siren calls on behalf of the remote past and the desired future As such the present was suffused with the pathos of being neither but subject to both

A collection of some 500 snapshots assembled by the Czech architect František Sammer between 1931 and 1939 had been stored unnoticed for more than 70 years in an unlikely location the Sri Aurobindo Ashram in Pondicherry India. Sammer was one of Le Corbusier's closest assistants from the early 1930s. Later Sammer worked in the Soviet Union, Japan and India. During and after his time in Paris he personally took or collected these photographs which he then deposited at the ashram when he left to fight in World War II. The images offer a remarkable view of the international community of people who worked in Le Corbusier's atelier in the 1930s. Among those featured in the photographs are Charlotte Perriand, Pierre Jeanneret, Jane West the first American woman to work for Le Corbusier, Gordon Stephenson, Antonin Raymond, Junzo Sakakura and Josep Lluís Sert. Given the travels and international background of these individuals the photographs are from different countries around the world including the USSR, England, France, Czech Republic, Greece, USA, Tennessee, Montana, California and New Mexico, Japan and India. A significant ideological transition has taken place in the discipline of architecture in the last few years. In Russia, legislation on the separation of church and state in early 1918 marginalized religious faith and raised pressing questions about what was to be done with church buildings. While associated with suspect beliefs, they were also regarded as structures with potential practical uses and some were considered works of art. This engaging study draws on religious anthropology, sociology, cultural studies and history to explore the fate of these socialist churches, showing how attitudes and practices related to them were shaped both by laws on the preservation of monuments and anti-religious measures. Advocates

of preservation while sincere in their desire to save the buildings were indifferent if not hostile to their religious purpose. Believers on the other hand regarded preservation laws as irritants except when they provided leverage for use of the buildings by church communities. The situation was eased by the growing rapprochement of the Orthodox Church and Soviet state organizations after 1943 but not fully resolved until the Soviet Union fell apart.
