Thorington Hall Thornham Hall Ufford Place The British Country House Revival Ben Cowell, 2024 British country houses have experienced a renaissance since the early 1970s A new accord is needed today recognising the increasingly contested contribution of country houses to British cultural life Fifty years ago the future for country houses in Britain looked bleak The Victoria Albert Museum's exhibition The Destruction of the Country House which opened in October 1974 charted the loss of over a thousand country houses in the preceding century The makers of the exhibition warned that history could be about to repeat itself because of the threats besetting mansion properties principally from higher taxation Houses faced the prospect of having to be stripped of their collections and sold for use as offices hotels or hospitals with their parks and gardens turned into golf clubs Government might afford to save just a handful of the most significant of these places working in tandem with charities such as the National Trust The rest would be consigned to history This book traces the history of country houses in Britain from the Destruction exhibition to the present day The wave of country house losses anticipated in 1974 never actually happened Instead over the next five decades Britain's country houses experienced a renaissance Fiscal rules changed in the mid 1970s to make it easier for owners to hold on to their assets Economic improvements in the 1980s and 1990s allowed many houses and estates to develop profitable commercial businesses All of this was achieved only after dedicated campaigning from heritage organisations in support of the country house cause The book argues that a new accord is needed today to recognise and value the ongoing if increasingly contested contribution of country houses to British life and culture in the twenty first century Lost Country Houses of Nottinghamshire Maxwell Craven, 2025-05-15 A fascinating description of the lost country houses of Nottinghamshire will be of interest to all those who live in the county or know it well

Meakin, 2017-07-05 Lady Anne Bacon Drury 1572 a huge punch 1624 was the granddaughter and niece of two of England's Lord Keepers of the Great Seal Sir Nicholas Bacon and Sir Francis Bacon Lady Anne was also the friend and patroness of John Donne and Joseph Hall however she deserves to be remembered in her own right Within her massive country house Lady Anne created a tiny painted room that she seems to have used as a kind of three dimensional book The walls consisted of panels of pictures and mottoes grouped under Latin sentences These panels can still be viewed in a Suffolk museum Christchurch Mansion in Ipswich Some panels point to classical and Biblical sources and to popular emblem books The sources of other panels are more recondite while still others are original compositions by Lady Anne The panels exhibit a contemptus mundi theme and reflect a struggle with ambition pride and even despair Some panels also appear to register carefully veiled but pointed critiques of political and religious events and figures Lady Anne's painted closet or architext is thus relevant to a wide range of early modern scholarship in various disciplines but is as yet largely unappreciated For the first time in four hundred years this book fully describes the closet and places it in its personal social intellectual and aesthetic contexts It argues for the painted closet's importance for understanding early modern conceptualizations of private and public spaces and for illuminating fundamental early modern habits of seeing and reading especially combinations of text and image Finally this book explores the closet as an example of the ingenious ways in which female subjectivity found ways to express itself even within the constraints of early modern Huguenot Networks, 1560-1780 Vivienne Larminie, 2017-10-02 These chapters explore patriarchal society in England how a religious minority not only gained a toehold in countries of exile but also wove itself into their political social and religious fabric The way for the refugees departure from France was prepared through correspondence and the cultivation of commercial military scholarly and familial ties On arrival at their destinations immigrants exploited contacts made by compatriots and co religionists who had preceded them to find employment London a hub for the Protestant international from the reign of Elizabeth I provided openings for tutors and journalists Huguenot financial skills were at the heart of the early Bank of England Huguenot reporting disseminated unprecedented information on the workings of the Westminster Parliament Huguenot networks became entwined with English political factions Webs of connection were transplanted and reconfigured in Ireland With their education and international contacts refugees were indispensable as diplomats to Protestant rulers in northern Europe They operated monetary transfers across borders and as fund raisers helped alleviate the plight of persecuted co religionists Meanwhile French ministers in London attempted to hold together an exceptionally large community of incomers against heresy and the temptations of assimilation This is a story of refugee networks perpetuated but also interpenetrated and remade **Lost Mansions** J.
