<p><b>WALT:</b> Understand what humans needed for survival in the stone age</p>	<p>You have just woken up in the middle of nowhere and you are naked, hungry, tired and thirsty. What are you going to do first? (Linked to text of stone age boy we are looking at in English). Discuss as class.</p> <p><b>Activity 1:</b> Show children some problem-solving cards and ask them to decide in which order they would complete the actions – complete in pairs and then they must justify their orders.</p> <p>Explain that the Stone Age is the earliest record of human life and survival. Does anyone know why it's called the stone age? Humans managed to survive by making tools and weapons out of stones to hunt for animals to eat their meat and use their skin for clothes and shelter.</p> <p>Introduce the importance of tools and weapons – it was the difference between life or death. Show excerpt from stone age boy about making tools from flint.</p> <p>Explain that the stone age was so big that it was divided into 3 different areas – Palaeolithic, Mesolithic and Neolithic and that tools and weapons became increasingly sophisticated throughout these periods – show examples. Play video to show weapons and tools being made and their purposes explained.</p>	<p>What did humans need for survival in the stone age?</p> <p>Can you name the tools/weapons used?</p> <p>Can you name the areas of the Stone Age?</p>
