**History at the Limit of World-History** Ranajit Guha, 2003-08-27 The past is not just as has been famously said another country with foreign customs it is a contested and colonized terrain Indigenous histories have been expropriated eclipsed sometimes even wholly eradicated in the service of imperialist aims buttressed by a distinctly Western philosophy of history Ranajit Guha perhaps the most influential figure in postcolonial and subaltern studies at work today offers a critique of such historiography by taking issue with the Hegelian concept of World history That concept he contends reduces the course of human history to the amoral record of states and empires great men and clashing civilizations It renders invisible the quotidian experience of ordinary people and casts off all that came before it into the nether existence known as Prehistory On the Indian subcontinent Guha believes this Western way of looking at the past was so successfully insinuated by British colonization that few today can see clearly its ongoing and pernicious influence He argues that to break out of this habit of mind and go beyond the Eurocentric and statist limit of World history historians should learn from literature to make their narratives doubly inclusive to extend them in scope not only to make room for the pasts of the so called peoples without history but to address the historicity of everyday life as well Only then as Guha demonstrates through an examination of Rabindranath Tagore s critique of historiography can we recapture a more fully human past of experience and wonder

Agnani, 2013-05-09 In Hating Empire Properly Sunil Agnani produces a novel attempt to think the eighteenth century imagination of the West and East Indies together arguing that this is how contemporary thinkers Edmund Burke and Denis Diderot actually viewed them This concern with multiple geographical spaces is revealed to be a largely unacknowledged part of the matrix of Enlightenment thought in which eighteenth century European and American self conceptions evolved By focusing on colonial spaces of the Enlightenment especially India and Haiti he demonstrates how Burke s fearful view of the French Revolution the defining event of modernity as shaped by prior reflection on these other domains Exploring with sympathy the angry outbursts against injustice in the writings of Diderot he nonetheless challenges recent understandings of him as a univocal critic of empire by showing the persistence of a fantasy of consensual colonialism in his thought By looking at the impasses and limits in the thought of both radical and conservative writers Agnani asks what it means to critique empire properly Drawing his method from Theodor Adorno s quip that one must have tradition in oneself in order to hate it properly he proposes a critical inhabiting of dominant forms of reason as a way forward for the critique of both empire and Enlightenment Thus this volume makes important contributions to political

Martin Fitzpatrick, Peter Jones, 2017-01-12 Over the last fifty years, the life and work of Edmund Burke (1729-1797) has received sustained scholarly attention and debate. The publication of the complete correspondence in ten volumes and the nine volume edition of Burke's Writings and Speeches have provided material for the scholarly reassessment of his life and works. Attention has focused in particular on locating his ideas in the history of eighteenth century theory and practice and the contexts of late eighteenth century conservative thought. This book broadens the focus to examine the many sided interest in Burke's ideas, primarily in Europe and most notably in politics and aesthetics. It draws on the work of leading international scholars to present new perspectives on the significance of Burke's ideas in European politics and culture.

**X—The Problem of the Negro as a Problem for Thought** Nahum Dimitri Chandler, 2013-12-15 X The Problem of the Negro as a Problem for Thought offers an original account of matters African American and, by implication, the African

diaspora in general as an object of discourse and knowledge. It likewise challenges the conception of analogous objects of study across dominant ethnological disciplines e.g. anthropology, history and sociology and the various forms of cultural, ethnic and postcolonial studies. With special reference to the work of W. E. B. Du Bois, Chandler shows how a concern with the Negro is central to the social and historical problematization that underwrote twentieth century explorations of what it means to exist as an historical entity, referring to their antecedents in eighteenth century thought and forward into their ongoing itinerary in the twenty first century. For Du Bois, the problem of the color line coincided with the inception of a supposedly modern horizon. The very idea of the human and its avatars, the idea of race and the idea of culture emerged together with the violent hierarchical inscription of the so called African or Negro into a horizon of commonness beyond all natal premises, a horizon that we can still situate with the term global. In ongoing struggles with the idea of historical sovereignty, we can see the working out of then new concatenations of social and historical forms of difference as both projects of categorical differentiation and the irruption of originary revisions of ways of being. In a word, the world is no longer and has never been one. The world, if there is such, from the inception of something like the Negro as a problem for thought, could never be only one. The problem of the Negro in America is thus an exemplary instance of modern historicity in its most fundamental sense. It renders legible for critical practice the radical order of an ineluctable and irreversible complication at the heart of being, its appearance as both life and history as the very mark of our epoch.

*Post-Orientalism* Hamid Dabashi, 2017-07-28. *Post Orientalism* is a sustained record of Hamid Dabashi's reflections over many years on the question of authority and power. Who gets to represent whom and by what authority? Dabashi's work picks up where Edward Said's *Orientalism* left off. Said traced the origin of the power of representation and the normative agency that it entails to the colonial hubris that carried a militant band of mercenary merchants, military officers, Christian missionaries and European Orientalists around the globe. This hubris enabled them to write and represent the people they sought to rule. Dabashi's book is not as much a critique of colonial representation as it is of the manners and modes of fighting back and resisting it. He does not question the significance of Orientalism and its principal concern with the colonial acts of representation, but he provides a different angle that argues for the primacy of the question of postcolonial agency. Dabashi uses the United States as an example of a country that initiated militant acts of representation in Iraq and Afghanistan. He attempts to unearth and examine the United States' deeply rooted claim to normative and moral agency, particularly in light of the world's post 9/11 political reality.

**Geometries of Silence** Anna Ottani Cavina, 2004. Based on little known or hitherto unpublished material and enhanced by a wealth of rarely seen illustrations, this book offers access to the aesthetics of neoclassical Europe from a new perspective: landscape painting and interior decoration. The source documents, together with the nexus of relationships they helped to establish, reveal a world shaken by a series of epochal changes.
