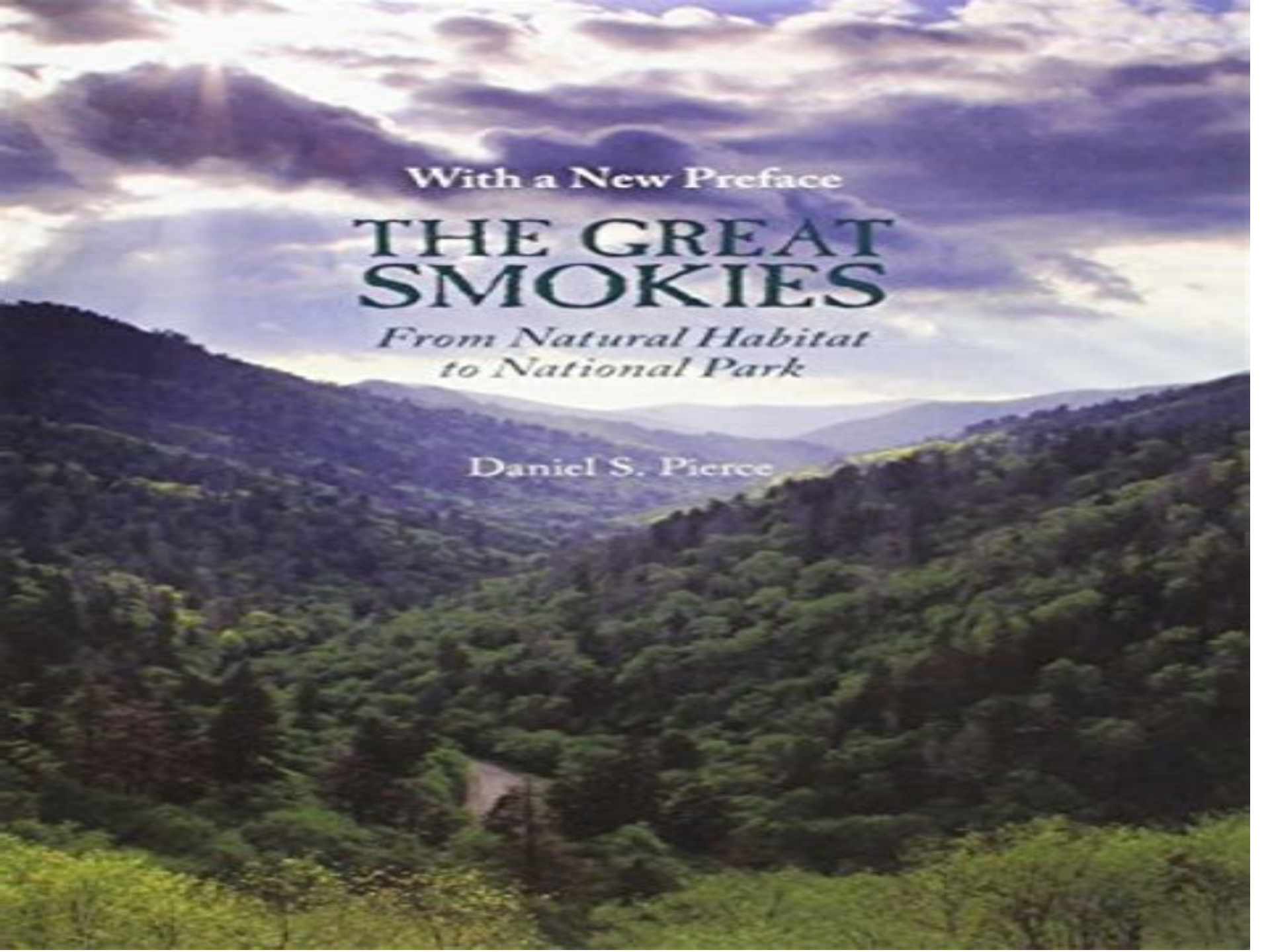

majesty and mystery of the Great Smoky Mountains have lured mankind The Cherokee were among the first to build thriving communities here and backcountry frontiersmen were next to put down roots In time visitors arrived eager to take in the cool mountain air and returned home with stories of hillbillies Then came those who used the mountains for their own advantages such as lumber barons armed with steam shovels and skidders Eventually civic boosters from western North Carolina and east Tennessee took note and began advocating for the protection of the Great Smoky Mountains Before a national park could be established though there were competing interests to be sorted and a consideration of the lives affected

Reconciling Nature Robert M. Myers, 2019-10-30 *Reconciling Nature* maps the complex views of the environment that are evident in celebrated American novels written between the Centennial Celebration of 1876 and the end of the Second World War During this period which includes the Progressive era and the New Deal Americans held three contradictory views of the natural world a recognition of nature's vulnerability to the changes brought by industrialism a fear of the power of nature to destroy human civilization and a desire to make nature useful Robert M Myers argues they reconciled these conflicting views through nature nostalgia policing of wilderness areas and through strategies of control borrowed from the social sciences Myers combines environmental history with original readings of eight novels producing fresh perspectives on Mark Twain's *Adventures of Huckleberry Finn* Stephen Crane's *Maggie* Kate Chopin's *The Awakening* Upton Sinclair's *The Jungle* Mary Austin's *The Ford* Theodore Dreiser's *An American Tragedy* Zora Neale Hurston's *Their Eyes Were Watching God* and William Faulkner's *Go Down Moses* While previous ecocritical works have focused on proto environmentalism in classic works of literature *Reconciling Nature* explores the ambivalence within these texts demonstrating how they reproduce views of nature as threatened threatening and useful The epilogue examines the environmental ideologies associated with the development and deployment of the first atomic bomb

individual and region making stereotypically Appalachian conditions self-perpetuating. Whether exploring grassroots activism in the Clearfork Valley, the agrarian traditions and subsequent displacement of Cades Cove residents, or Knoxville's efforts to promote trade, tourism, and industry, Banker's detailed historical excursions reveal not only a profound richness and complexity in the East Tennessee experience but also a profound interconnectedness. Synthesizing the extensive research and revisionist interpretations of Appalachia that have emerged over the last thirty years, Banker offers a new lens for constructively viewing East Tennessee and its past. He challenges readers to reconsider ideas that have long diminished the region and to re-imagine Appalachia. And ultimately, while *Appalachians All* speaks most directly to East Tennesseans and other Appalachian residents, it also carries important lessons for any reader seeking to understand the crucial connections between history, self, and place. In the last couple of decades, conservation practitioners working at all levels of governance and all spatial scales have embraced the CARE principles of conservation planning: Comprehensiveness, Adequacy, Representativeness, and Efficiency. Hundreds of papers have been written on this theme, and several different kinds of software programs have been developed and used around the world, making conservation planning based on these principles global in its reach and influence. Does this mean that all the science of conservation planning is over, that the discovery phase has been replaced by an engineering phase as we move from defining the rules to implementing them in the landscape? This book and the continuing growth in the literature suggest that the answer to this question is most definitely no. It all seems pretty simple: what, where, when, how, and why. However, stating a problem does not mean it is easy to solve. **Let Us Now Praise Famous Gullies** Paul S. Sutter, 2015-12-15. Providence Canyon State Park, also known as Georgia's Little Grand Canyon, preserves a network of massive erosion gullies allegedly caused by poor farming practices during the nineteenth century. It is a park that

protects the scenic results of an environmental disaster While little known today Providence Canyon enjoyed a modicum of fame in the 1930s During that decade local boosters attempted to have Providence Canyon protected as a national park insisting that it was natural At the same time national and international soil experts and other environmental reformers used Providence Canyon as the apotheosis of human and particularly southern land abuse Let Us Now Praise Famous Gullies uses the unlikely story of Providence Canyon and the 1930s contest over its origins and meaning to recount the larger history of dramatic human induced soil erosion across the South and to highlight the role that the region and its erosive agricultural history played in the rise of soil science and soil conservation in America More than that though the book is a meditation on the ways in which our persistent mental habit of separating nature from culture has stunted our ability to appreciate places like Providence Canyon and to understand the larger history of American conservation

Driskell, Robert J. Norrell, 2024-01-12 Nestled amid the western slopes of the Great Smoky Mountains in East Tennessee bisected by the Little River and including the community of Townsend Tuckaleechee Cove is known today as the peaceful side of the Smokies Celebrated for its natural beauty the area is also the site of human habitation dating back at least 13 000 years Tuckaleechee Cove's rich past emerged from years of archaeological and historical research that began in 1999 when a state highway project uncovered a wealth of Native American and Euro American remains including burial mounds fragments of tools weapons cooking vessels and other evidence of past activity This bountifully illustrated book combines details from that study with fascinating bits of history to tell the story of the cove and its disparate peoples The earliest Native Americans to visit the area were hunters and foragers who moved in small bands through the cove setting up temporary camps Over the millennia foraging gave way to more settled farming practices with the establishment of permanent settlements about 2 000 years ago By the 1600s the area's residents were Cherokees who would soon encounter European explorers and traders Displacing the Cherokees Euro Americans formed a number of small communities in the cove with colorful names like Frog Town and Needmore They farmed the land built churches schools and small businesses and fought in the Civil War In 1900 a northern investor named W B Townsend recognized the area's potential as a source of timber and two years later the town bearing his name was literally abuzz with sawmill activity By the Great Depression however the mills had closed bringing hardship to cove residents A measure of relief came in 1934 when the Great Smoky Mountains National Park was established nearby opening a new still unfolding chapter in the area's history Boyce N Driskell is the past director of the Archaeological Research Laboratory and adjunct research professor in the Department of Anthropology at the University of Tennessee Knoxville Robert J Norrell is a professor and the Bernadotte Schmidt Chair of Excellence in the Department of History at the University of Tennessee Knoxville **Earth's Landscape** Joyce A.
