Makúk John Sutton Lutz, 2009-01-01 John Lutz traces Aboriginal people's involvement in the new economy and their displacement from it from the arrival of the first Europeans to the 1970s Drawing on an extensive array of oral histories manuscripts newspaper accounts biographies and statistical analysis Lutz shows that Aboriginal people flocked to the workforce and prospered in the late nineteenth century He argues that the roots of today's widespread unemployment and welfare dependency date only from the 1950s when deliberate and inadvertent policy choices what Lutz terms the white problem drove Aboriginal people out of the capitalist wage and subsistence economies offering them welfare as compensation

At Home with the Bella Coola Indians Douglas Cole, John Barker, 2012-01-01 Between 1922 and 1924 the young Canadian anthropologist T F McIlwraith spent eleven months in the isolated community of Bella Coola British Columbia living among the people of the Nuxalk First Nation During his time there McIlwraith gained intimate knowledge of

the Nuxalk culture and of their struggle to survive in the face of massive depopulation loss of traditional lands and the efforts of the Canadian government to ban the potlatch McIlwraith's resulting ethnography *The Bella Coola Indians* 1948 is widely considered the finest published study of a Northwest Coast First Nation This volume is a rich complement to McIlwraith's classic work incorporating his letters from the field as well as previously unpublished essays on the Nuxalk Vivid and lively the letters show the human side of the anthropologist and provide a fascinating insight into the famous Northwest winter ceremonials and potlatch events in which McIlwraith was one of the few white men privileged to participate as a dancer and partner Extensive editorial annotations and striking photographs make this book a pleasurable read that will appeal to anthropologists and historians as well as those with interests in Northwest cultures and the history of anthropology in Canada

Robson, 2015-04-25 When the first edition of Raincoast Chronicles was produced by a couple of novice publishers in the unlikely location of Pender Harbour in 1972 it boldly announced that it was going to put BC character on the record Printed in sepia ink and decorated with the rococo flourishes characteristic of that extravagant era the unclassifiable journal cum serial book about life on the BC coast struck a nerve and in time became something very close to what it set out to be a touchstone of British Columbia identity Soon the term Raincoast which had been coined by the editors was appearing on boats puppet theatres interior decorating firms and at least one other publishing enterprise Raincoast Chronicles also created another publishing enterprise Harbour Publishing Many of the stories that started out as articles in the Chronicles grew into books and so the White family was more or less forced to get into book publishing to deal with them That undertaking went on to publish some six hundred books and counting about every possible aspect of BC and in 2014 celebrated its fortieth anniversary in the biz To honour that occasion this special double issue of Raincoast Chronicles takes a tour down memory lane selecting a trove of the most outstanding stories in all those Harbour books and republishing them in one volume Here are some of Canada's most exciting and iconic writers Al Purdy Anne Cameron Edith Iglauer Patrick Lane and Grant Lawrence to start a long list Here also are stories of disasters at sea scarcely believable bush plane feats eerie events at coastal ghost towns and a First Nations elder who has seen so many sasquatches he finds them sort of boring Full of great drawings and photos this jumbo anniversary edition of Raincoast Chronicles is a feast of great Pacific Northwest storytelling [Lessons in Legitimacy](#) Sean Carleton, 2022-09-15 Between 1849 and 1930 government assisted schooling in what is now British Columbia supported the development of a capitalist settler society Lessons in Legitimacy examines state schooling for Indigenous and non Indigenous peoples public schools Indian Day Schools and Indian Residential Schools in one analytical frame Schooling for Indigenous and non Indigenous children and youth functioned in distinct yet complementary ways teaching students lessons in legitimacy that normalized settler capitalism and the making of British Columbia Church and state officials administered different school systems that trained Indigenous and non Indigenous peoples to take up and accept unequal roles in the
