Prior to the lesson identify the topic, specify learning objectives, and prepare examples and nonexamples. Examples should be high-quality and should contain a variety. The context for examples should also be planned in advance. Phase 1: The teacher introduces the lesson and attempts to gain the attention of students.

Phase2- The teacher shows the students examples and asks them to make observations and compare the examples. Phase3- The teacher asks more

specific questions that are designed to lead students to an understanding of the concept, or generalization

Phase 4- The teacher guides students to a definition of the concept or a statement of the generalization. The students apply their understanding of the new context. Formative- The teacher can assess students by listening to how they answer the questions that she asks.

Summative-Teachers can formally assess students by having them create examples of what they learned during the lesson. Students get a chance to take control of their learning. They don't have to listen to a lecture, but rather form their own understanding by exploring the topic. The retention of information can be rewarding for those that normally forget everything that they hear in a lecture.

So what? What is important to understand about this?

This model will take up more time, but guided learning results in a deeper understanding than lectures and explanations.
