performed pioneering work in artificial intelligence for top secret government projects He wrote the original software for targeting cities in a nuclear hot war and he was one of the first scientists to recognize the danger of nuclear winter As a Cold Warrior he designed logical systems that modeled rational human and machine behaviors and yet he was largely oblivious to the emotional damage his irrational personal behavior inflicted upon his family lovers and business partners He died young but left behind a fascinating record of his life including correspondence with such philosophically inclined physicists as Niels Bohr Norbert Wiener and John Wheeler These remarkable letters illuminate the long and often bitter struggle to explain the paradox of measurement at the heart of quantum physics In recent years Everett's solution to this mysterious problem the existence of a universe of universes has gained considerable traction in scientific circles not as science fiction but as an explanation of physical reality
