Landscape in Children's Literature Jane Carroll, 2012-08-06 This book provides a new critical methodology for the study of landscapes in children's literature Treating landscape as the integration of unchanging and irreducible physical elements or topoi Carroll identifies and analyses four kinds of space sacred spaces green spaces roadways and lapsed spaces that are the component elements of the physical environments of canonical British children's fantasy Using Susan Cooper's *The Dark Is Rising Sequence* as the test case for this methodology the book traces the development of the physical features and symbolic functions of landscape topoi from their earliest inception in medieval vernacular texts through to contemporary children's literature The identification and analysis of landscape topoi synthesizes recent theories about interstitial space together with earlier morphological and topoanalytical studies enabling the study of fictional landscapes in terms of their physical characteristics as well as in terms of their relationship with contemporary texts and historical precedents Ultimately by providing topoanalytical studies of other children's texts Carroll proposes topoanalysis as a rich critical method for the study and understanding of children's literature and indicates how the findings of this approach may be expanded upon In offering both transferable methodologies and detailed case studies this book outlines a new approach to literary landscapes as geographical places within socio-historical contexts

Language and Ideology in Children's Fiction John Stephens, 1992 When children read fiction they are exposed to the beliefs which inform and structure their society The books encourage child readers to internalise particular ways of seeing the world and help shape their development as individuals Although this process forms a key part of their education it remains largely invisible As well as a story fictions impart a significance to readers often without revealing its presence or ground and therefore have considerable potential to socialize their audience John Stephens analyses this process and shows how fictions can work to constrain or liberate audience responses He explores picture books as well as historical realistic and fantastic fictions to show how both a character within the narrative and the implied reader are positioned within ideology The author considers areas of ideology not previously examined and offers new perspectives on realism and fantasy The book will be of interest to linguists and teachers as well as to the general reader

more rarefied category of art objects Styles in African headrests are usually defined in terms of western art and archaeological discourses but this book interrogates these definitions of style and demonstrates the shortcomings of defining a single formal style model as exclusive to a single ethnic group Among the artefacts made by southern African peoples headrests were the best known Anita Nettleton's study of the uses and forms of headrests opened up a number of art historical methodologies in the attempt to gain an understanding of form style and content in African art objects Her drawings of each and every headrest encountered become a major part of the project

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
