While practical in orientation, the book is based solidly on empirical evidence. Building on the success of the previous edition, this handbook has been extensively revised in a number of ways. Throughout the book, the text, references, and website addresses have been updated to reflect important developments since the publication of the first edition. Recent research findings on the epidemiology, aetiology, course, outcome, assessment, and treatment of all psychological problems considered in this volume have been incorporated into the text. Section 3 focuses on anxiety problems, social phobia, generalized anxiety disorder, panic disorder, obsessive compulsive disorder, post-traumatic stress disorder, and depersonalization disorder. Section 4 deals with psychological problems linked to physical health, health anxiety, somatization, chronic pain, adjustment to cancer, and eating disorders. Section 5 focuses on other significant psychological problems that come to the attention of clinical
