**The Wizard of Oz** Salman Rushdie,2019-07-25 The Wizard of Oz was my very first literary influence writes Salman Rushdie in his account of the great MGM children s classic At the age of ten he had written a story Over the Rainbow about a colourful fantasy world But for Rushdie The Wizard of Oz is more than a children s film and more than a fantasy It s a story whose driving force is the inadequacy of adults in which the weakness of grown ups forces children to take control of their own destinies And Rushdie rejects the conventional view that its fantasy of escape from reality ends with a comforting return to home sweet home On the contrary it is a film that speaks to the exile The Wizard of Oz shows that imagination can become reality that there is no such place like home or rather that the only home is the one we make for ourselves Rushdie s brilliant insights into a film more often seen than written about are rounded off with his typically scintillating short story At the Auction of the Ruby Slippers about the day when Dorothy s red shoes are knocked down to 15 000 at a sale of MGM props In his foreword to this special edition published to celebrate the 20th anniversary of the BFI Film Classics series Rushdie looks back to the circumstances in which he wrote the book when in the wake of the controversy surrounding The Satanic Verses and the issue of a fatwa against him the idea of home and exile held a particular resonance

**Invasion of the Body Snatchers** Barry Keith Grant,2017-10-12 Upon its release in 1956 Don Siegel s Invasion of the Body Snatchers was widely perceived as another B movie thriller in the cycle of science fiction and horror films that proliferated in the 1950s Yet the film addresses numerous issues brewing in post war US society including the Cold War McCarthyism and the changing dynamics of gender relations In the fifty years since the film s release its reputation has grown from cult status to become an acknowledged classic of American cinema With its narrative of emotionless alien duplicates replacing average folk Invasion of the Body Snatchers was the first post war horror film to locate the monstrous in the everyday thus marking it as a pivotal moment in American horror film history four years before Psycho In this first comprehensive critical study of the film Barry Keith Grant traces Invasion s historical and generic contexts to explore the importance of Communism and conformity post war modernity and gender politics in order to understand the film s cultural significance and metaphorical weight He also provides an account of the film s fraught production history and offers an extended discussion of the distinctive contributions of the production personnel Concluding

with a consideration of the three remakes it has inspired Grant illustrates how *Invasion of the Body Snatchers* enduring popularity derives from its central metaphor for the monstrous which has proven as flexible as that of the vampire and the zombie

**Rebecca** Patricia White, 2021-05-06 The 1940 film adaptation of Daphne du Maurier's gothic romance *Rebecca* begins by echoing the novel's famous opening line Last night I dreamt I went to Manderley again Patricia White takes the theme of return as her starting point for an exploration of the film's enduring power Drawing on archival research she shows how the production and reception history of *Rebecca* the first fruit of the collaboration between Hollywood movie producer David O Selznick and British director Alfred Hitchcock is marked by the traces of women's contributions White provides a rich analysis of the film addressing the gap between perception and reality that is constantly in play in the gothic romance and highlighting the queer erotics circulating around it the heroine Mrs Danvers and the dead but ever present Rebecca Her discussion of the film's afterlives emphasizes the lasting aesthetic impact of this dark masterpiece of memory and desire while her attention to its remakes and sequels speaks to the ongoing relevance of its vision of gender and power
