undertakes as it enters its second decade Young Projects process often begins with simple exercises in making form finding experiments they undertake within their Brooklyn studio Material research has included hand pulling plaster with an irregular knife using furniture foam as a casting bed and forming concrete with palm stems These experiments among many others mine characteristics that are not typically associated with conventional architectural materials and break traditional methodology allowing for qualities of randomness and spontaneity to enter the process of making The studio finds that letting go of control at the right moments produces results that are often surprising entirely bespoke and resist replication
