*Infinite Conversation* Maurice Blanchot, 1992-12-16 In this landmark volume Blanchot sustains a dialogue with a number of thinkers whose contributions have marked turning points in the history of Western thought and have influenced virtually all the themes that inflect the contemporary literary and philosophical debate today Blanchot waits for us still to come to be read and reread I would say that never as much as today have I pictured him so far ahead of us Jacques Derrida Blake and Conflict S. Haggarty, J. Mee, 2008-11-28 Famously Blake believed that without contraries there could be no progression Conflict was integral to his artistic vision and his style but it had more to do with critical engagement than any urge to victory The essays in this volume look at conflict as it marked Blake's thinking on politics religion and the visual arts

*Romanticism, Hermeneutics and the Crisis of the Human Sciences* Scott Masson, 2017-11-28 The human sciences established and developed in the nineteenth century have slowly disintegrated It is an ironic end It was in the name of the greater legitimacy of more universal psychological criteria that its architects disavowed the traditional theological standard for valuing and evaluating human words and deeds With hindsight we can see that universality was indeed gained but only at the cost of alienating any sense of common legitimacy Harold Bloom defending the canon largely in the humanising moral sense convention of critics operating since Matthew Arnold has resolutely maintained the common legitimacy of aesthetic value against the claims of particular interest groups But the very universality attached to aesthetic value is at odds with the world of common sense and thus lies at the root of the problem To complicate matters this universality has been understood as a traditional criterion A more radical treatment of the subject is needed This study begins by surveying the field of modern hermeneutics Noting its repeated crises of self-legitimation it traces these to circular beliefs bequeathed by Romanticism that human nature is self-begetting and can thus be known intimately and autonomously After providing a historical overview of how human nature had been understood the focus shifts to the attack in Coleridge's *Biographia Literaria* on Wordsworth's 1802 Preface to *Lyrical Ballads* and to a reading of some key Romantic texts It reads Coleridge's famous definition of the imagination as an attack on Romantic hermeneutics rooted in the traditional view that man has been created in *Imago Dei*

**Memory in Shakespeare's Histories** Jonathan Baldo,2011-12-22 A distinguishing feature of Shakespeare s later histories is the prominent role he assigns to the need to forget This book explore the ways in which Shakespeare expanded the role of forgetting in histories from King John to Henry V as England contended with what were perceived to be traumatic breaks in its history and in the fashioning of a sense of nationhood For plays ostensibly designed to recover the past and make it available to the present they devote remarkable attention to the ways in which states and individuals alike passively neglect or actively suppress the past and rewrite history Two broad and related historical developments caused remembering and forgetting to occupy increasingly prominent and equivocal positions in Shakespeare s history plays an emergent nationalism and the Protestant Reformation A growth in England s sense of national identity constructed largely in opposition to international Catholicism caused historical memory to appear a threat as well as a support to the sense of unity The Reformation caused many Elizabethans to experience a rupture between their present and their Catholic past a condition that is reflected repeatedly in the history plays where the desire to forget becomes implicated with traumatic loss Both of these historical shifts resulted in considerable fluidity and uncertainty in the values attached to historical memory and forgetting Shakespeare s histories in short become increasingly equivocal about the value of their own

acts of recovery and recollection

### **Darren Aronofsky's Films and the Fragility of Hope** Jadranka

Skorin-Kapov, 2015-11-19 Darren Aronofsky's Films and the Fragility of Hope offers the first sustained analysis of the current oeuvre of the film director screenwriter and producer Darren Aronofsky. ### **The Social Life of Fluids**

Jules David Law, 2018-07-05 British Victorians were obsessed with fluids, with their scarcity and with their omnipresence. By the mid-nineteenth century, hundreds of thousands of citizens regularly petitioned the government to provide running water and adequate sewerage, while scientists and journalists fretted over the circulation of bodily fluids. In *The Social Life of Fluids*, Jules Law traces the fantasies of power and anxieties of identity precipitated by these developments as they found their way into the plotting and rhetoric of the Victorian novel. Analyzing the expression of scientific understanding and the technological manipulation of fluids—blood, breast milk, and water—in six Victorian novels by Charles Dickens, George Eliot, George Moore, and Bram Stoker, Law traces the growing anxiety about fluids in Victorian culture from the beginning of the sanitarian movement in the 1830s through the 1890s. Fluids, he finds, came to be regarded as the most alienable aspect of an otherwise inalienable human body and paradoxically as the least rational element of an increasingly rationalized environment. Drawing on literary and feminist theory, social history, and the history of science and medicine, Law shows how fluids came to be represented as prosthetic extensions of identity, exposing them to contested claims of kinship and community and linking them inextricably to public spaces and public debates.
