

Immune System Study Guide

1. Differentiate the nonspecific and specific immune pathways.
 - a. Our immune system is a **functional system** within our body, it prevents invasion of pathogens to prevent disease.
 - b. **Nonspecific immune system** – not specific about things that it attacks, will attack anything foreign and treat them all the same.
 - c. **Specific immune system** – we have cells within our body that are pre-engineered to respond to specific pathogens. A certain blood cell will only interact with a certain bacteria. Our specific cells only act on things that they are predetermined to act on.
2. Identify the nonspecific defenses, both superficial and internal.
 - a. **Skin** - superficial – unbroken skin is a great barrier, it prevents entry of things into the body and has different layers and thicknesses.
 - b. **Mucous membranes – superficial** - linings of cavities inside the body, moist with mucous so the mucous becomes an additional barrier. The mucous itself functions as a **trap**, pathogens get stuck in it instead of going to the bloodstream when we breathe them in.
 - i. **Acidic environments** – if bacteria enter the skin the acid tried to break it down (**acid mantle**) and debilitate the bacteria so they can't get any further in our body.
