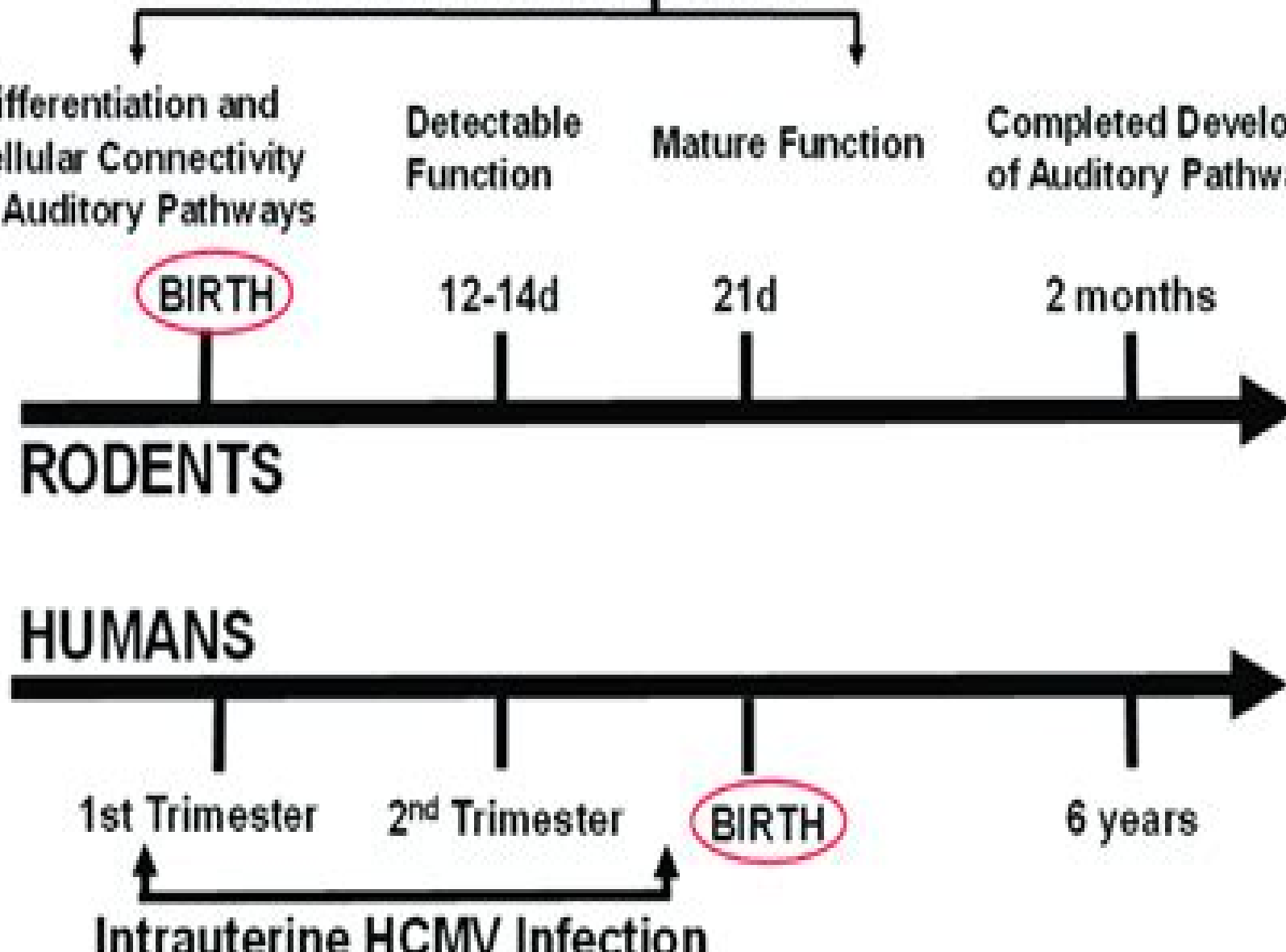

Helekar,2013-10-17 Basic research over the last decade or two has uncovered similarities between speech especially its sensori motor aspects and vocal communication in several non human species The most comprehensive studies so far have been conducted in songbirds Songbirds offer us a model system to study the interactions between developmental or genetic predispositions and tutor dependent influences on the learning of vocal communication Songbird research has elucidated cellular and molecular mechanisms underlying learning and production of vocal patterns perception of vocal sounds vocal motor control and vocal neuromotor plasticity More recently the entire genome of the songbird zebra finch has been sequenced These discoveries along with the identification of several genes
