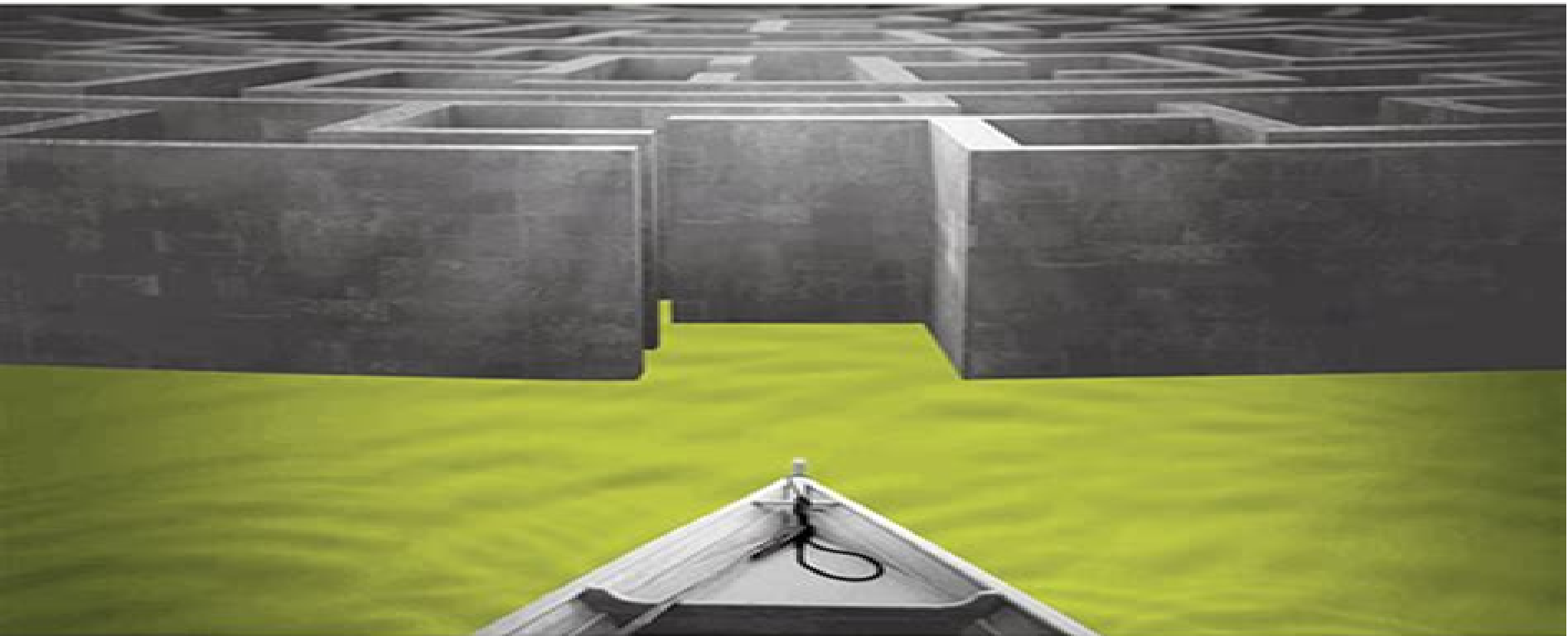

The Happy Hsiungs Diana Yeh, 2014-03-01 Try Something Different Something Really Chinese *The Happy Hsiungs* recovers the lost histories of Shih I and Dymia Hsiung two once highly visible but now largely forgotten Chinese writers in Britain who sought to represent China and Chineseness to the rest of the world Shih I shot to worldwide fame with his play *Lady Precious Stream* in the 1930s and became known as the first Chinese director to work in the West End and on Broadway Dymia was the first Chinese woman in Britain to publish a fictional autobiography in English Diana Yeh traces the Hsiungs' lives from their childhood in Qing dynasty China and youth amid the radical May Fourth era to Britain and the USA where they rubbed shoulders with George Bernard Shaw James M Barrie H G Wells Pearl Buck Lin Yutang Anna May Wong and Paul Robeson In recounting the Hsiungs' rise to fame Yeh focuses on the challenges they faced in becoming accepted as modern subjects as knowledge of China and the Chinese was persistently framed by colonial legacies and Orientalist discourses which often determined how their works were shaped and understood She also shows how Shih I and Dymia in negotiating acceptance performed not only specific forms of Chineseness but
