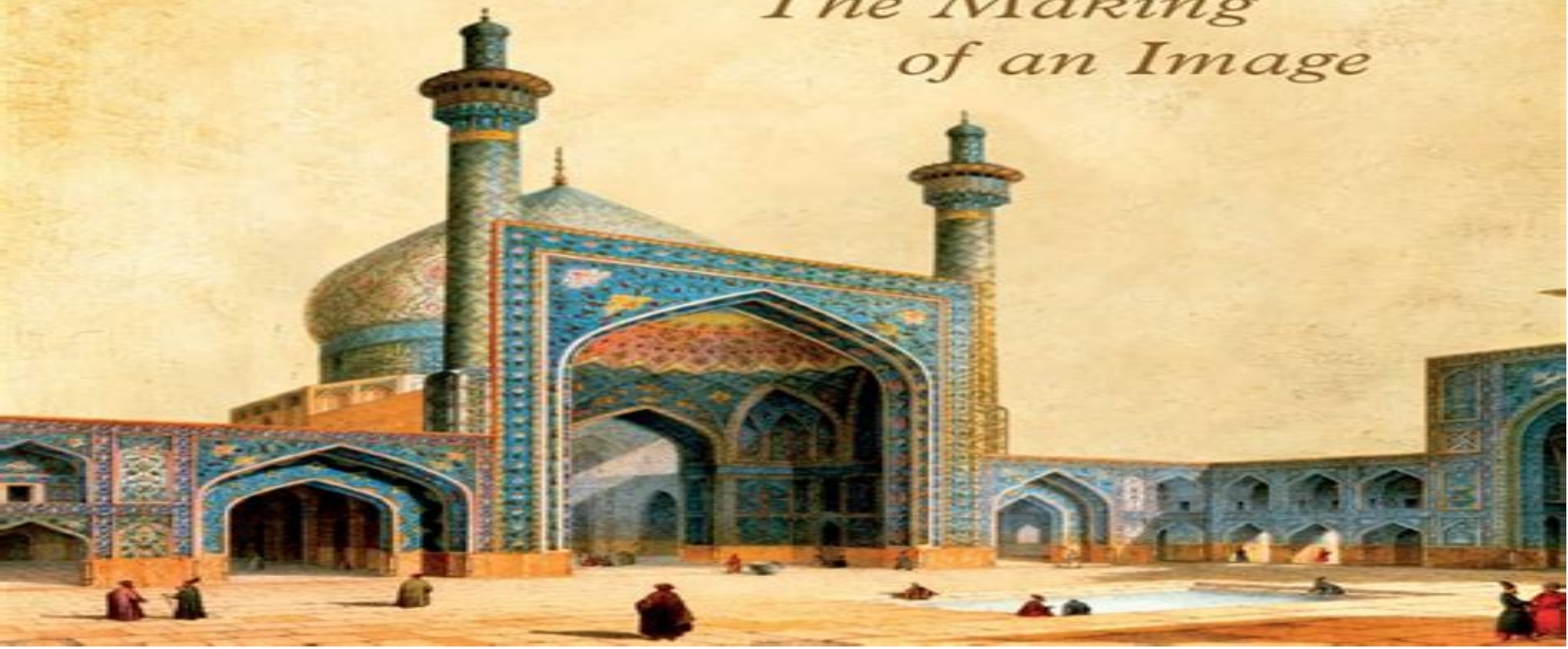

**Saracens, Demons, & Jews** Debra Higgs Strickland, 2003 These images which reached a broad and socially varied audience across Western Europe appeared in virtually all artistic media including illuminated manuscripts stained glass sculpture metalwork and tapestry *Representations of the Orient in Western Music* Nasser Al-Tae, 2017-07-05 This book focuses on the cultural political and religious representations of the Orient in Western music Dr Nasser Al Tae traces several threads in a vast repertoire of musical representations concentrating primarily on the images of violence and sensuality Al Tae argues that these prevailing traits are not only the residual manifestation of the Ottoman threat to Western Europe but also the continuation of a long and complex history of fear and fascination towards the Orient and its Islamic religion In addition to analyses of musical works Al Tae draws on travel accounts paintings biographies and political events to engage with important issues such as gender race and religious differences that may have contributed to the variously complex images of the Orient in Western music The study extends the range of Orientalism to cover eighteenth century Austria nineteenth century Russia and twentieth century America The book challenges those scholars who do not see

Orientalism as problematic and tend to ignore the role of musical representations in shaping the image of the Other within a wider interdisciplinary study of knowledge and power

Akil, 2016-12-22 This book considers the ways in which Muslims view the way they are being viewed not viewed or incorrectly viewed by the West The book underscores a certain will to visibility whereby Muslims Arabs wish just to be seen and to be marked as fellow human beings The author relates the failure to achieve this visibility to a state of desperation that inextricably and symmetrically ties visibility to violence When Syrian and Palestinian refugees recently started refusing to be photographed they clearly ushered the eventual but inevitable collapse of the image and its final futility The photograph has been completely emptied of its last remaining possibility of signification The book attempts to engage with questions about the ways in which images are perceived within cross cultural contexts Why and how do people from different cultural backgrounds view the same image in opposing ways why do cartoon photographs and videos become both the cause and target of bloody political violence as witnessed recently by the deadly attacks against Charlie Hebdo in France and in the swift military response by the US Jordan France and others to videotaped violence by ISIS

This historical study of Jewish life in Medieval Europe provides a much needed corrective to the popular notion of constant persecution Ivan G Marcus Yale University In *Living Together Living Apart* Jonathan Elukin traces the experience of Jews in Europe from late antiquity through the Renaissance and Reformation revealing how the pluralism of medieval society allowed Jews to feel part of their local communities despite recurrent expressions of hatred against them Elukin shows that Jews and Christians coexisted more or less peacefully for much of the Middle Ages and that antisemitic violence was largely isolated He reveals an extraordinary picture of Jews living comfortably among their Christian neighbors working with them and occasionally cultivating lasting friendships even as Christian culture often demonized Jews As Elukin makes clear the expulsions of Jews from England France Spain and elsewhere were not the inevitable culmination of persecution but arose from the religious and political expedencies of particular rulers He demonstrates that the history of successful Jewish Christian interaction in the Middle Ages in fact laid the social foundations that gave rise to the Jewish communities of modern Europe

The Spiritual Expansion of Medieval Latin Christendom: The Asian Missions James D. Ryan, 2017-03-02

During the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries religious zeal nourished by the mendicants sense of purpose motivated Dominican and Franciscan friars to venture far beyond Europe s cultural frontiers to spread their Christian faith into the farthest reaches of Asia Their incredible journeys were reminiscent of heroic missionary ventures in earlier eras and far more exotic than evangelization during the tenth through twelfth centuries when the western church Christianized Eastern Europe and Scandinavia This new mission effort was stimulated by a variety of factors and facilitated by the establishment of the Mongol Empire and as the fourteenth century dawned missionaries entertained fervent but vain hopes of success within khanates in China Central Asia Persia and Kipchak The reports these missionaries sent back to Europe have fascinated successive generations of historians who analyzed their travels and struggled to understand their motives and aspirations The essays selected for this volume drawn from a range of twentieth century historians and contextualized in the introduction provide a comprehensive overview of missionary efforts in Asia and of the developments in the secular world that both made them possible and encouraged the missionaries hopes for success Three of the studies have been translated from French specially for publication in this volume

**Exploring the Qur'an** Muhammad Abdel Haleem, 2017-04-21 The teachings style and impact of the Qur an have always been matters of controversy among both Muslims and non Muslims But in a modern context of intercultural sensitivity what the Qur an says and means are perhaps more urgent questions than ever before This major new book by one of the world s finest Islamic scholars responds to that urgency Building on his earlier groundbreaking work the author challenges misinterpretations of particular Qur anic verses from whatever quarter He addresses the infamous sword verse frequently cited as a justification for jihad He also questions the tribute verse associated with the Muslim state subjugating Jews and Christians and the idea of Paradise in the Qur an often viewed by the West as emphasising merely physical pleasures or used by Islamic fighters as their just reward for holy war The author argues that wrenching the verses out of the context of the whole has led to dangerous ideologies being built on isolated phrases which have then assumed afterlives of their own This nuanced holistic reading has vital interfaith ramifications

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
