James Rybka, 2011-05-01 Bohemian composer Bohuslav Martinu 1890-1959 was exceptionally prolific composing over 400 imaginative well-crafted and diverse pieces including symphonies operas ballet scores and other orchestral works For 12 years 1941-1953 he lived in America during which he enjoyed a brilliant reputation and his works were played by nearly all the major orchestras Yet today his works are rarely performed In Bohuslav Martinu The Compulsion to Compose F.
